Dog Care Proficiency Program A Member's Guide

OVERVIEW

The 4-H Dog Care Proficiency program helps you learn what you need to know about your 4-H project.

Your project leader will assist you in setting and achieving your goals. Through your project, you will acquire an understanding of the principles of dog handling and care.

There are many resources to help you learn more about your project:

- The University of California Davis has free resources available online by visiting: http://anrcatalog.ucdavis.edu/4HYouthDevelopment/. This site lists a variety of project materials and resources recommended for use in your project.
- ➤ The Lassen County 4-H Resources and Lending Library at our county 4-H Office includes other books, videos, and reference materials that can be checked out by members and leaders.
- Check to see if there are any local dog groups or organizations in your community that conducts educational activities for you and your dog. Local breeders and veterinarians are excellent sources of help and information.

There are five levels in the Project Proficiency Program. You may choose how many levels you wish to complete:

- ◆ Level I "Explorer", you begin to learn about many different aspects of dog care.
- ◆ Level II "Producer", you practice and refine the many skills involved in owning and caring for your dog.
- ◆ Level III "Consumer", you become experienced in dog care.
- ◆ Level IV "Leader", allows you to show your own leadership potential.
- ◆ Level V "Researcher", you carry out a demonstration or experiment on some aspect of Dog Care, and prepare a paper or portfolio.

As you work through the proficiency program, your leader will date each skill item as you complete it. When all items in a proficiency level are completed, your leader will sign the Certificate of Achievement.

	7.	Name and describe the characteristics of the seven breed groups as defined by the American Kennel Club.			
	8.	Demonstrate understanding of exercises used in novice obedience.			
	9.	Discuss do's and don'ts for showmanship classes. Give at least three examples of each.			
	10.	Demonstrate an "I" pattern or an "L" pattern as used in showmanship classes. Show "about" and "reverse" turn and demonstrate how to stack your dog.			
	11. Do something creative with your project outside of your club.				
	12.	Participate in a community service or citizenship activity with your dog project group.			
	13.	Obtain contact information for the American Kennel Club and identify at least two types of information you can obtain from them. Also identify and obtain contact information for two dog-related resources.
