# Goat (Dairy, Meat, Fiber) Proficiency Program A Member's Guide

#### **OVERVIEW**

The 4-H Goat Proficiency program helps you learn what you need to know about your 4-H project. Your project leader will assist you in setting and achieving your goals. Through your project, you will learn animal care basics, good management practices and record keeping. You will also learn about the size and scope of the animal industry as it relates to your project.

There are many resources to help you learn more about your project:

- ➤ The Lassen County 4-H Resources and Lending Library at our county 4-H Office includes other books, videos, and reference materials that can be checked out by members and leaders.
- Check to see if there is a breeder's organization in your community that conducts educational activities and shows. Local breeders are excellent sources of help and information.

There are five levels in the Project Proficiency Program. You may choose how many levels you wish to complete:

- ◆ Level I "Explorer", you begin to learn about many different aspects of raising animals.
- ◆ Level II "Producer", you practice and refine the many skills involved in learning about and raising animals.
- ◆ Level III "Consumer", you become an experienced animal raiser.
- ◆ Level IV "Leader", allows you to show your own leadership potential.
- ◆ Level V "Researcher", you carry out a demonstration or experiment on some aspect of the beef project, and prepare a paper or portfolio.

As you work through the proficiency program, your leader will date each skill item as you complete it. When all items in a proficiency level are completed, your leader will sign the Certificate of Achievement.

	6.	Demonstrate basic grooming techniques and equipment necessary for the care of your breed of goat.				
	7.	Demonstrate (show and tell) how to lead your breed of goat properly, including appropriate collar/lead types, correct placement of the collar/lead, and proper hand positions.  Describe four safety issues associated with your goat's environment and/or handling your goat.  Explain how external temperatures (hot and cold weather) can affect your breed of goat and what you can do to protect your goat.

	10.	Explain and demonstrate a simple health check including temperature and provide the normal temperature range for a goat.				
	11. Explain how to tell if your goat is ill and when or how to find a loc					
	12.	Demonstrate how to trim your goat's hooves, and then explain why and how often this should be done.				
	Demonstrate a method of deworming a goat. Provide a typi schedule for your breed of goat.					
	14.	Describe your own goat project and your goals in the project.				
	Maintain and submit records on your project including such costs as: the purchase of the animal, equipment, feed, housing, records of immunizations and medications, and so on.					
	16.	Present a project meeting report to your club.				
	17.	Participate in a community service/citizenship activity related to your project.

### GOAT (DAIRY, MEAT, FIBER) Level II - Producer

	1. -	Identify six breeds or six breed specific colors of goats.			
	2.	Identify 15 external parts of a goat from a diagram or live goat.			
	3.	Explain how to determine the minimum age of a goat based on the development of its teeth.			
	4.	Explain and demonstrate how to tattoo a goat. Explain what the tattoos on the left and right ears or tail webs of a registered goat represent.			
	5.	Explain breed requirements and the process for registering a goat with its national or international breed association.			
	6.	Obtain contact information for national or international goat breed associations and identify at least two types of information you can obtain from them. Also identify and obtain contact information for two breeders of your breed of goat.			
	7.	Explain selecting a goat for purchase, such as correctness of breed standard for conformation, color, dairy capacity, rate of growth, fiber texture/length, and other factors important for your specific breed and project goals.			
	8.	Compare and contrast the conformation of three goats of the same type or breed.			
	9.	Identify what diseases or conditions may be prevented by immunizations or other medicines. Implement an immunization schedule for your project, and determine drug withdrawal periods of your breed of goat.			
	10.	Explain the symptoms and treatments for four common goat illnesses.			
	11.	State the breeding age and weight requirements of your breed of goat. Tell what the breeding season is for your breed of goat, and the length of gestation.			
	12.	Describe how and why you sanitize your goat's equipment and housing facilities.			
	- 13.	Describe the proper fitting of your breed of goat, and the tools needed when preparing for a judged show. Identify supplies to take to a show.			
	14.	Demonstrate competency in the showmanship of your goat, e.g., how to properly handle your goat from setting up to maneuvering in the show ring in front of a judge.			
	15.	Participate in a goat showmanship competition.			
	16.	Submit management records for 30 days that indicate how often you provide clean housing, water and feed for your goat and record when you groom your goat.			
	17.	Do something creative with your project, and share it at a club meeting.			

	18.	Compare and contrast your goat project and goals in Level I and Level II. How has it been enhanced since Level I?
	19.	Participate in a community service/citizenship activity related to your project.
	20.	Participate in a 4-H event outside your club, i.e. county, sectional, state events.

#### GOAT (DAIRY, MEAT, FIBER) Level III - Consumer

	1.	Describe the normal ranges of and demonstrate how to take the pulse and respiration of a goat.
	2.	Describe the digestive system of a goat. Explain how to assess a goat for conditions such as bloat, acidosis, and rumen failure and discuss prevention and treatment methods.
	3.	Describe the nutritional requirements of your breed of goat through one production cycle, from prior to breeding through weaning and drying off.
	4.	Describe signs that a doe might exhibit when she is ready for breeding (in heat). Describe signs that a doe might exhibit when close to delivering kids. Compile a list of basic supplies to have on hand for birthing.
	5.	Identify normal and abnormal birthing positions for kids, and explain two methods for correcting an incorrect position. Provide examples of when a veterinarian may be required to assist in the birth.
	6.	Describe and differentiate between the terms "fault" and "disqualification", and give at least two examples of each for your breed of goat.
	7.	Judge a showmanship class of at least three goat handlers. Provide reasons for your placement of 1 over 2, and so on.
	8.	Describe and explain a positive breeding program including choosing mates that will enhance and achieve your breeding program goals.
	9.	Explain correct injection procedures and the use of epinephrine. Describe and compare an intramuscular injection and a subcutaneous injection. Identify sites for each type of injection on a live goat.
	10.	Choose and design your own lesson plan and implement it in your project with the appropriate materials.
	11.	Assist younger members in the design of project needed materials and/or equipment.
	12.	Prepare and give a speech or demonstration relating to goats outside of the project group.
	13.	Start a reference library for your project.
	14.	Explore local, state and/or national affiliations and opportunities associated with the project, i.e. breed organizations.
	15.	Assist in organizing a county, sectional, or state event. The focus here is on learning the process of organization.
