Horsemastership Proficiency Program A Member's Guide

OVERVIEW

The 4-H Horsemastership Proficiency program helps you learn what you need to know about your 4-H project. Your project leader will assist you in setting and achieving your goals. Through your project, you will learn horse behavior, mounting and dismounting, proper and safe techniques when handling a horse and general riding techniques.

There are many resources to help you learn more about your project:

- ➤ The Lassen County 4-H Resources and Lending Library at our county 4-H Office includes other books, videos, and reference materials that can be checked out by members and leaders.
- Check to see if there is a breeder's organization in your community that conducts educational activities and shows. Local breeders are excellent sources of help and information.

There are five levels in the Project Proficiency Program. You may choose how many levels you wish to complete:

- ◆ Level I "Explorer", you begin to learn about many different aspects of safe handling and horsemastership.
- ◆ Level II "Producer", you practice and refine the many skills involved in learning about horsemastership and the show ring.
- ◆ Level III "Consumer", you will learn proper riding position and become a more experienced horseman.
- ◆ Level IV "Leader", allows you to show your own leadership potential.
- ◆ Level V "Researcher", you carry out a demonstration or experiment on some aspect of horsemastership, and prepare a paper or portfolio.

As you work through the proficiency program, your leader will date each skill item as you complete it. When all items in a proficiency level are completed, your leader will sign the Certificate of Achievement.

	6.	Demonstrate proper care of riding equipment when not in use and how to clean it.
	7.	Demonstrate the aids required for riding at a walk, jog, lope, back, stop and sidepass.
	8.	Demonstrate a basic figure 8 pattern at a lope using proper leads.
	9.	Back horse in a straight line.
	10.	Demonstrate stops from walk, jog, and lope.
	11.	Know and identify six major horse breeds and basic purpose of each breed.
	12.	Pick 6 common equine terms and explain them.
	13.	Describe the difference between blemished and unsoundness and identify both on a horse. (Give examples)
