FOCUS ON 4H POLICY

Smoking is one of the leading causes of death and illness in America. Smoking has been linked to everything from heart disease, cancer and stroke to asthma, wrinkles and yellow teeth. Tobacco is highly addictive and relatively expensive. There is no known long-term benefit to smoking or chewing tobacco.

In response to the negative health outcomes related to smoking, 4-H staff and volunteers aim to help 4-H members remain tobacco free. Tobacco (smoking and chewing) is not allowed at any 4-H event. This serves three purposes: (1) reduces secondhand smoke exposure to the children present (and everyone else); (2) reduces the acceptance of tobacco as a socially positive activity by creating a positive social pressure on the children to remain tobacco free; (3) decreases risk of unintentional injury. Fires are commonly started by cigarettes and 4-H events are often held in areas where there is dry debris (e.g. hay) nearby.

Club websites - To fulfill the need for increased channels of communication with the public and at the same time adhere to UC guidelines and policies, the State 4-H Office is recommending that clubs work with their respective county offices to post club information on the UCCE county website. This will allow only authorized staff to administer the site, provides for consistent and accurate information, and protects the privacy of leaders and members. Contact your 4-H Staff about hosting club information. Note: The county website must be using ANR SiteBuilder 3.

Doodle poll – Allows you to create an online poll to schedule an event or make a majority decision. No registration required. Doodle polls provide a simpler way of communicating with a group regarding their availability (by day and time) for events, meetings, etc. http://www.doodle.com/

Google calendar – Provides users with an online calendar which can be updated and shared with others (members, volunteers, parents, etc.). This calendar tool provides options for customized notifications, invitations and RSVPs, offline access, and a mobile version on your phone. http://calendar.google.com

Adobe Connect - A web conferencing tool for online meetings, eLearning, and webinars which provides an alternative to face-to-face meetings. Based on Adobe Flash technology, Adobe Connect allows participants to easily collaborate and share ideas online. Contact your 4-H staff to setup a meeting room for your 4-H club! https://uc-d.na4.acrobat.com Blog – A website that is regularly updated with entries providing news and/or commentary, descriptions of events, and pictures or videos. Blogs allow readers to stay informed about various topics and provide an option for individuals to leave comments or contribute to blog discussions. - 4. Members are not required to wear a 4-H uniform, but should be neatly dressed.
- Prepared speeches are 2-5 minutes talks on topics of your choice but may extend up to 10 minutes based on age or experience. Judges do not see script. Any topic is acceptable. Jr. Divison: 7 & 8th grade, Sr. Division: high school.
- 6. Impromptu speeches are for Sr. Division only. Presentation must be 2-5 minutes. Contestants draw three topics, quickly select one of them, prepare speech in 3 minutes.
