Frequently Asked Questions:

How do I prune my Hybrid Tea and Grandiflora Roses?

In our mild winter climate, the rule of thumb is to prune in January or before dormancy breaks. Here are some tips.



- Remove dead, diseased, old or weak canes.
- Cut the remaining canes to about 1 1/2 to 2 feet above the ground. Cut at a 45° angle just above outward-facing buds.
- If there is a hole in the center of the stem where an insect has tunneled, keep cutting the stem lower to the ground until you don't see the hole.

Don't be afraid to prune. Hybrid Tea roses benefit from heavy winter pruning and your roses will look fabulous in the spring!

Climbing, shrub and ground cover roses are pruned differently.
