Frequently Asked Questions:

I have heard that this is the time of the year to plant your winter vegetables. Is this right?

Yes, right now is the perfect time to plant your winter vegetables. Many plants such as broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower and onions can be started with transplants. Carrots, lettuce, peas, radishes, onion and spinach can be easily started by seed.

Winter vegetables are easier than summer ones because mother nature takes care of the watering ,weed suppression and many insects. When you plant make sure the area will have winter sun. What is sunny now may be shady later. Until it starts to rain you will have to water.

Other veggies to try—beets, celery, kale, collards, parsnips, rhubarb, turnips.

Give it a try! What do you have to lose? Just tuck some transplants into your existing flower beds. Viola, you have an instant edible garden!
