FAIR NEWS – ATWOOD HALL STILL EXHIBITS



New changes for 4-H Still Exhibits have been made. Be sure to read the premium book carefully and thoroughly.

- New instructions for entering: enter online, download form, member/parent signs and turns into fair office. Fair office puts hard copies in 1 binder/club by May 9th. 4-H Staff reviews entries May 9th for age/project enrollment and award ordering needs. Project leaders review May 9-23, sign or disqualify entries. Leaders notify Fair staff of disqualifications.
- Best of Show will be awarded in each category (not division) with a ribbon and \$5 premium. All
 other places will be awarded a sticker to be exchanged for a ribbon if the exhibitor chooses. No
 entry fees will be charged.
- Open judging will be done in Atwood. Judges will give oral reasons, not written. Members may watch and listen to reasons from judges. The Fair office will provide tape recorders to the judges in order to accommodate members not able to attend. The 4-H office will transcribe tapes and provide hard copy to the Fair Office.
- Still exhibits except food and horticulture will be accepted Sunday, June 3, 2012, noon-6:00 p.m.
- Those exhibits will be judged Monday, June 4, 2012 in the morning, time TBA in premium book.
- Food and horticulture exhibits will be accepted Thursday morning, time TBA in premium book.
- Food and horticulture exhibits will be judged Thursday.
- All still exhibits will be released Monday, June 11th, 8:00 a.m.-12:00 noon. It is your responsibility to pick up your items during these times or they may be disposed of.
- 4-H Country Store and CANstruction will continue again this year in Atwood Hall. For details on CANstruction and Country Store see the April 4-H newsletter.



FAIR TRASH CANS

Cans will be available for pick up to those that registered on Friday, May 25^{th} at the east end of the horse barn. Each group will find their name on a piece of 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ x11 piece of paper on the can.

To be considered for judging the cans must be returned to the east end of the horse barn by 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday, June 6, 2012 in order to be judged. Cans must be identified with the name of group and be decorated according to the theme of the fair. The best of each specie trash can will receive \$25 from Council.

THE COLUSA FAIR 4-H COUNTRY STORE

We will have a mandatory meeting at the fairground in Atwood Hall at 2:00pm on June 3rd. You must bring a parent with you. At that time you will get your tags and sign up for your work schedule for the fair – remember that we need adults too!

The 4-H Country Store will be located in Atwood Hall and will be open from 5-11pm on Thursday and Friday and from 12-11pm on Saturday and Sunday during the fair.

All 4-Her's are eligible to prepare home baked items and other items they wish to sell at this store. Members make money for themselves. There is no limit per child regarding items that they can sell. If you were enrolled in a crafts, sewing, gardening or foods project (this year or previously), you can sell items you have made and keep the money earned! The items sold do not have to be made in the project (you just need to have learned the skills in a 4-H project so you have the proper training for health and safety).

You must sign up to work one shift (2 hours) at the Colusa Fair 4-H Country Store. Primary members (and anyone needing help making change) must have an adult with them. You need to wear your 4-H uniform or a 4-H tee-shirt to make it clear that the products were made by 4-H kids.

Food items: cookies, brownies, muffins, bread, cupcakes, jam, etc. – you must also attach your own label with the name of the item and all the ingredients. Each item must be individually wrapped to keep it from being touched directly. It is helpful to display similar items in a basket or other container. Crafts: let your imagination run wild! Anything appropriate for 4-H is fine.

Plants: must be in a tray or something to contain the overflow when watered.

Bring items to sell EARLY EACH DAY of the Fair.

4-H HAT INFORMATION

Achievement pins are fastened to the service stripes, starting with the first-year pin next to the 4-H clover. The All-Star pin should be fastened to the center of the All-Star emblem. Medals may be worn on either side of the cap, but not too many of them. No other pins or ribbons should be worn on the cap. The cap should reflect the dignity of 4-H Club work, and not be cheapened by fastening to it every emblem, award, and ribbon won by the wearer. Keep your cap clean, especially when you wear it with the full uniform.

2012 SUTTER YUBA COUNTIES 4-H/FFA HORSE SHOW

The **2012 Sutter Yuba Counties 4-H/FFA Horse Show entry form** is now available online. The show is scheduled for June 16th and will be held at Butte Star Ranch in Sutter. Pre-Registration deadline is June 1st.

Please follow these instructions to enter the show:

- 1) Read the Rules and Class Schedule (available at the link below).
- 2) Click the Yellow Box: "Horse Show Online Entry"
- 3) Complete Form for each rider AND each horse that will be ridden (You MUST specify which classes will be shown by each horse).
- 4) Pay careful attention to the following checkboxes:
 - a. You must certify that the rider has had possession of each horse for at least 120 days prior to the show, and has not been under the care of a professional trainer.
 - b. Each member must verify that they have read and understand the rules and sign an electronic signature.
 - c. Parents must give their consent by signing an electronic signature.
 - d. You must provide the name and email address of your horse project leader. They will be notified prior to the show to verify that you are eligible to ride the horses you have entered.
- 5) Pre-registration Fees: \$4.99 per class or \$30 all-day pass. DUE JUNE 1st
- 6) Submit Payment, either by credit card online on one of each member's forms or by check to the Sutter/Yuba 4-H Office. Payment MUST be received by the 4-H Office by June 1st to avoid the \$20 late fee.

GET READY TO TAKE THE 4-H ECO-BOT CHALLENGE!

4-H National Headquarters and National 4-H Council are pleased to reveal the 2012 National Science Experiment for *4-H National Youth Science Day*. The *4-H Eco-Bot Challenge* will introduce youth to engineering concepts as they program a self-directed robot to clean up a simulated environmental spill.

Developed by The Ohio State University and Ohio State Extension, this unique experiment will engage young people in finding a solution to an environmental challenge, using engineering design skills.

The experiment will test their ability to:

- Build an autonomous robot using household materials
- Design and construct a programmed environment for a working robot
- Develop a hypothesis and carry out a test
- Collaborate and offer modifications to produce an optimized solution
- Generate links among engineering, technology, science, math and society

This annual youth science event will be held on **Wednesday, Oct. 10, 2012**, and will bring 4-H'ers together from all around the nation to complete this single, innovative experiment.

Participation in *4-H National Youth Science Day* is meant to help spark an early passion for science, engineering and math and to encourage young people to consider these paths of study and future careers.

Cody Murphy is chosen as the Merit Award winner and receives the registration and travel sponsorship to the 4-H State Leadership Conference. Cody is the son of Sean and Adrian Murphy of Arbuckle 4-H. This is what Cody has to say about his leadership experience thus far:

My experience as a Jr. Leader has been a great one. I have had the opportunity to be a Jr. Leader in the boys cooking project as well as in the poultry project.

During my experiences as a boys cooking Jr. Leader I was able to share my love of cooking with younger boys in our group. I was excited to offer a boys cooking group because I know with having two older sisters sometimes cooking tends to be classified as a girl's hobby and boys are reluctant to try. I was able teach kitchen safety, recipe selection, as well as nutritional facts about food. We learned dutch oven cooking, bbq'ing and baking at our meetings. I was able to teach a part all on my own. This helped develop my public speaking skills as well as time management in knowing how long it would take to teach and complete a task.

My passion is my poultry project! I have been a Jr. Leader for the poultry project for three years now. I have taught everything from egg production and parts of the egg to bio security with your backyard flock. This year I planned and executed for the first time a Colusa County Poultry Fun Day. There were over 30 kids in attendance from three different counties. Guest speakers from the poultry industry gave workshops. We had a knowledge quiz, breed and egg ID contest and many more fun activities for the members and parents to participate in and learn more about poultry. In the future I plan to become a teen leader in the poultry project and keep working with members on the Avian Bowl Team that we recently formed.

I have also had the pleasure this year of becoming a delegate from Colusa County to attend California Focus. This is a citizenship and leadership conference that takes place this summer at the Capital building in Sacramento. The study investigated the impacts of participation in 4-H on young people's interest and participation in science. Results indicated that although elementary-grade 4-H members are not more interested in science than other youth, by high school, participation in 4-H is associated with a greater number of science classes and higher-level science coursework. These results suggest that the 4-H program may have the ability to influence science interest and participation in the long term among its members.

• Weight of the Nation (Free HBO Series)

The Weight of the Nation, a four-part documentary aired on Home Box Office (HBO) and is to be available for viewing free of charge on <u>HBO's site</u> (<u>www.hbo.com/theweightofthenation</u>). - **Episode 2 Choices:** Shares scientific insights into how to lose weight and explores what needs to change in people's lives, including where they work, eat, learn and play, while spotlighting individuals who are waging the battle successfully.
- Episode 3 Children in Crisis: Tells the heart-wrenching stories of young people struggling with excess weight and facing serious medical complications at an early age, and examines how marketing shapes food choices.
- **Episode 4 Challenges:** Examines the driving forces behind the obesity epidemic, including agriculture, economics, evolutionary biology, racial and socioeconomic disparities, and physical inactivity.
