COLUSA COUNTY 4-H FEES INCREASE

The state 4-H office is increasing the fees paid by each county this program year. For 2012-13, fees will be \$10 per adult and \$40 per member for Colusa County. (state fee = \$28, Colusa County fee= \$12/member.)These fees are due when your family enrolls for the 2012-13 program year. If it is a hardship families may request a fee waiver/reduction from their club. Clubs are reminded to use the form provided at last year's Council meeting.

For the 2013-14 program year the state is increasing the member fee to \$40 so Council will be considering increasing the county fee next year. Your input is valued and welcomed. Contact your local club's Key Leaders or the 4-H Office.

The State 4-H Office gave this statement:

"The economic climate has created extreme economic challenges in continuing to provide strong volunteer and programmatic support for 4-H locally. For the past several years, in the face of declining funding from state and federal resources, UC Cooperative Extension and 4-H at the state level have tried to absorb budget shortfalls in order to keep from raising fees to our participants. Unfortunately we have reached the point where we are no longer able to absorb all costs and have realized that fee increases to support and grow our local programming are required. These program fees will be used to provide partial funding for direct local program costs including 4-H staff who support our local volunteers.

For 2012-2013, fees will be increased to \$10.00 per adult and \$28.00 per youth. We are projecting for 2013-2014 an additional increase based upon anticipated funding status, which will most likely result in fees of \$15.00 per adult and \$40.00 per youth.

We encourage local staff and volunteer leadership to work with us to strategize together around the development of a local funding plan to keep 4-H strong and growing. The California 4-H Foundation is a valuable resource with who to partner in developing a local funding plan. The level of success of such coordinated local fundraising efforts is hoped to mitigate the need for future increases."

BEGINNING A NEW YEAR

The 4-H Youth Development Program of the University of California is committed to providing a safe environment for young people involved in Cooperative Extension activities. All volunteer leaders are required to enroll online (each year), be fingerprinted for a background check and attend an orientation meeting one time only, (unless there is a break in service.) If a volunteer plans to take a year off they are encouraged to enroll and pay the \$10.00 fee so they do not need to re-do



orientation and fingerprinting the following year. Any adult chaperoning an event (camp, SLC, etc.) must sign up as a 4-H leader and go through the process prior to the event.

We are asking each of you to recruit one new leader. We know everyone is busy so encourage them to take the team approach. Two or three leaders can share the six hour minimum project requirement, making their time commitment for a project not as demanding. Without our volunteer leaders, the projects available will decrease and so will our enrollment. Let's all help to keep our youth in Colusa County involved in this worthwhile program.

IMPORTANT: December 1st all those not enrolled are dropped from our mailing list and computer records. Also on December 1st access to online enrollment is blocked. Those enrolling after this deadline must do so at the 4-H Office.

2012 4-H NATIONAL YOUTH SCIENCE DAY

2012 4-H National Youth Science Day Powering the Nation's Future Coincides with National 4-H Week, October 7 - 13, 2012

The fifth annual 4-H National Youth Science Day will be held nationally on Wednesday, October 10, 2012. The 2012 National Science Experiment, 4-H Eco-Bot Challenge, will explore how to utilize robotics and environmental cleanup.

Engineering Robotic Solutions

As the nation looks to address important environmental issues, youth are at the forefront of the discussion. In 4-H, young people are taught the skills they need to become the nation's future leaders. Consequently, it is important for youth to understand the challenges faced by the global community, and the opportunities to make a positive impact on communities and ecosystems.

For the fifth annual 4-H National Youth Science Day (NYSD), The Ohio State University Extension has designed the 4-H Eco-Bot Challenge: the 2012 National Science Experiment. The experiment will introduce youth to robotic engineering concepts as they program an autonomous robot to clean up a simulated environmental spill.

4-H National Headquarters and National 4-H Council are pleased to reveal the 2012 National Science Experiment for *4-H National Youth Science Day*. The *4-H Eco-Bot Challenge* will introduce youth to engineering concepts as they program a self-directed robot to clean up a simulated environmental spill.

Developed by The Ohio State University and Ohio State Extension, this unique experiment will engage young people in finding a solution to an environmental challenge, using engineering design skills.

The experiment will test their ability to:

- Build an autonomous robot using household materials
- Design and construct a programmed environment for a working robot
- Develop a hypothesis and carry out a test
- Collaborate and offer modifications to produce an optimized solution
- Generate links among engineering, technology, science, math and society

This annual youth science event will be held on **Wednesday, Oct. 10, 2012**, and will bring 4-H'ers together from all around the nation to complete this single, innovative experiment.

Participation in 4-H National Youth Science Day is meant to help spark an early passion for science, engineering and math and to encourage young people to consider these paths of study and future careers.

James Gonzalez (Madera County), April Lackpour (San Diego County), and Paige Wasniak (Sonoma County) departed for Japan on June 14, after an overnight orientation with other 4-H delegates in Chicago. They have been living with host families in the greater Tokyo area while attending daily Japanese language (Nihongo) classes at Labo headquarters in the Nishi-shinjuku district of Tokyo. A major part of this experience is commuting up to 90-minutes each way between their Japanese homes and the Labo offices—resulting in an incredible boost in self-confidence. When the four-week language program ends, these delegates will move to a second host family in another part of Japan for a month-long homestay.

Ashleigh Ehrke (Colusa County), Donald Godfrey (Nevada County), Emily Gudeman (El Dorado County), Daniel Ramey (Nevada County), and Valerie Weil (Orange County) are participating only in the month-long homestay. The study reported here investigated the impacts of participation in 4-H on young people's interest and participation in science. Survey data were collected from relatively large and ethnically diverse samples of elementary and high school-aged students in California. Results indicated that although elementary-grade 4-H members are not more interested in science than other youth, by high school, participation in 4-H is associated with a greater number of science classes and higher-level science coursework. These results suggest that the 4-H program may have the ability to influence science interest and participation in the long term among its members.
