COLUSA COUNTY 4-H FEES INCREASE

The economic climate has continued to sustain fiscal challenges facing 4-H programmatic support.

Last year we shared that UC Cooperative Extension and 4-H at the state level is no longer able to absorb all costs and that fee increases were necessary to support our local programming.

The 2013-2014 program fees are \$12.00 per adult and \$45.00 per youth.

These program fees will be used to provide partial funding for direct local program support including critical 4-H staff that supports our local programs.

If it is a hardship families may request a fee waiver/reduction from their club. Clubs are reminded to use the form provided at last year's Council meeting.

The State 4-H Office gave this statement:

"The economic climate has created extreme economic challenges in continuing to provide strong volunteer and programmatic support for 4-H locally. For the past several years, in the face of declining funding from state and federal resources, UC Cooperative Extension and 4-H at the state level have tried to absorb budget shortfalls in order to keep from raising fees to our participants. Unfortunately we have reached the point where we are no longer able to absorb all costs and have realized that fee increases to support and grow our local programming are required. These program fees will be used to provide partial funding for direct local program costs including 4-H staff who support our local volunteers.

We encourage local staff and volunteer leadership to work with us to strategize together around the development of a local funding plan to keep 4-H strong and growing. The California 4-H Foundation is a valuable resource with who to partner in developing a local funding plan. The level of success of such coordinated local fundraising efforts is hoped to mitigate the need for future increases."

BEGINNING A NEW YEAR

The 4-H Youth Development Program of the University of California is committed to providing a safe environment for young people involved in Cooperative Extension activities. All volunteer leaders are required to enroll online (each year), be fingerprinted for a background check and attend an orientation meeting one time only, (unless there is a break in service.) If a volunteer plans to take a year off they are encouraged to enroll and pay the



\$12.00 fee so they do not need to re-do orientation and fingerprinting the following year. Any adult chaperoning an event (camp, SLC, etc.) must sign up as a 4-H leader and go through the process prior to the event.

We are asking each of you to recruit one new leader. We know everyone is busy so encourage them to take the team approach. Two or three leaders can share the six hour minimum project requirement, making their time commitment for a project not as demanding. Without our volunteer leaders, the projects available will decrease and so will our enrollment. Let's all help to keep our youth in Colusa County involved in this worthwhile program.

IMPORTANT: On December 1st all those not enrolled are dropped from our mailing list and computer records. Also on December 1st access to online enrollment is blocked. Those enrolling after this deadline must do so at the 4-H Office.

A NEW MODEL FOR COUNTY 4-H LEADERSHIP

Dynamic and well-functioning leadership is so important to a vibrant 4-H community. Participation in the Sacramento County 4-H Council indicates that this governing body is long overdue for a tune-up. So, it's time for a change...and not a tune-up, but an over-haul.

Council meetings are marked by limited attendance, difficulty in recruiting officers, and an uncertainty around authority and purpose. Often times the Council's work is on administrative and management issues—budget, bylaws, and the like—with little emphasis on planning and program development. And its focus is generally on 4-H clubs and not the entire 4-H program. Perhaps most importantly, young people do not often enthusiastically participate.

Our 4-H program deserves a leadership structure that is engaging and empowering, one that supports leaders to envision our program's future, and set a path forward.

Both San Luis Obispo and Santa Barbara (and now Sacramento) 4-H communities have inspiring stories of new leadership and management structures that have transformed their organizations. Staff and volunteers report new events and programs, increased membership, a rise in volunteers, greater community involvement, and an increase in revenue. And they report that energy — that hard to measure intangible —is abundant.

Sacramento County (has) convene(d) a 4-H Futures Task Force to set in place a new, similar leadership structure. We see the rebuilding of our leadership team as an opportunity to:

Revitalize or expand the use of adult volunteers and young people as program managers

Develop an integrated and coordinated program delivery model

- Attract new high-performing volunteers to 4-H
- Engage more youth as equal partners in 4-H program development, management, and evaluation
- Expand 4-H's reach to touch the lives of more young people
- Vision all that 4-H can be in our community, and to create a plan to make it happen.

The above letter to Sacramento County 4-H families is applicable, in part, to Colusa County 4-H. At its May meeting the Colusa County 4-H Council was given a report on Volunteer Middle Management and approved 4-H Staff to proceed with its development. The first step is to study the current and future youth development needs of Colusa County by forming a Futures Task Force.

Task Force members have been invited by letter and the first 4-H Futures Task Force meeting will take place in August. The work is scheduled to be completed by October and reported at the November Council meeting. Know that we're moving forward, and in a very positive direction.

New National 4-H Curriculum: <u>Theatre Arts Curriculum</u>

This curriculum opens the world of theatre to youth in grades 5-8 (can be adapted for younger and older youth).
