# **POLICY**

# 4-H Policy and Information Update February 2016

The 4-H Youth Development Program, like many other programs, is confronting how to address new media like Facebook, Twitter and MySpace without compromising its brand and identity. These new media present opportunities and challenges for our program. They can help us to reach new audiences; re-connect 4-H alumni to the program; connect 4-H in California with 4-H anywhere else in the world. These new media can also encroach on personal space and blur the lines of what it permissible and decent. With that, I want to remind youth and adult volunteers that the <u>Code of Conduct</u> for the 4-H program still applies when engaging with social media in the name of 4-H. I want to highlight a few clauses in the Code of Conduct that are important to remember:

#### **CODE OF CONDUCT:**

Upon receiving a 4-H Volunteer Appointment Card signed by the County Director, all 4-H Volunteers shall act in ways that promote positive youth development and are not in conflict with its policies and procedures. The following are prohibited when acting on behalf of the 4-H program:

- Use of abusive, obscene, and discriminatory language at any 4-H activity or event
- Direct personal attack or harassment (visual, verbal, or physical) on another person
- Behavior that is illegal, unsafe, or contrary to the highest standards of ethics

#### RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Be committed to the core values, educational goals, and standards of the 4-H Youth
- Development Program as established at various organizational levels
- Respect and safeguard the individual rights, competencies, safety, and property of program participants

Prohibit discrimination of any policies, procedures, or practices on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, gender identity, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition (cancer-related or genetic characteristics), ancestry, marital status, age, sexual orientation, citizenship, or status as a covered veteran.

#### • Macy 4-H'ers El Niño Preparation

El Niño is a cycle where the surface temperatures of the Pacific Ocean rise a couple of degrees. The rise in temperature causes moisture in the air, leading to more rainfall. This change in the atmospheric circulation will only affect California if the storm is strong. The effects of El Niño may cause plenty of damage to landforms such as hills, mountains, and valleys. It might also lead to natural disasters in local areas such as parks and gardens.

One place that might be affected negatively is the Macy 4-H Garden. For example, the rain might erode the dirt in the weaker plots leaving the plants exposed. The smaller plants and succulents may drown from excess rainfall. The butterflies in different stages of metamorphosis might be washed or blown away due to the strong winds. They might even freeze to death because of the cold temperatures. These problems may severely damage our garden. If we want to keep our garden thriving, we will need to prepare for the upcoming storm.

When we returned to school in the new year, we noticed many benefits from the light showers. In the northwest plot, the lavender and rosemary are flourishing and the sunflowers are sprouting from the fertile soil. The pole beans, carrots, celery, and cucumbers in the northern middle plot are growing because they are catching most of the recent rainfall. Moving to the northeast side, the tomatoes are ripening, but the plant is gradually wilting. In the middle of the garden, the trees are starting to bear fruit. On the western side of the garden, there are four separate plots growing lettuce, kale, beets, and peppers. In the southeastern side, the eggplants are growing larger. The succulents are growing out beautiful pink flowers in the southern side. Even the greenery in the monarch butterfly habitat is blooming!

Since Macy Intermediate's garden has come a long way, it would be unfortunate if it were destroyed by Mother Nature. However, there are ways that we can help prepare and protect our garden. One way is to turn off the irrigation systems in our north and south plots. If we turn off the drip system and sprinklers, we will prevent the plants from being overwatered. Another way we can reduce the damage to our garden is if we cover up the walkways by laying straw over the path. We could use rain barrels to catch the rain and use it in the future. In order to keep the plants from being overwatered, we can cover the area with a tarp held up by bamboo sticks. We can stack sandbags around the exposed plots to keep the gravel away from the dirt. We should also break up the hard, compacted soil. That would allow the water to be more easily absorbed into the ground.

El Niño might have the ability to destroy many plants, insects, and other living organisms in the soil. As a club, we are aware of all the damages that might happen if we are not well prepared for the storm. We could use rain barrels to catch the extra rain, cover the path with straw, and cover the plots with tarps. Using these preventative measures we can help the garden continue to thrive and withstand the harsh El Niño.

- 1. The 4-H Youth Development Program has been successful in recruiting new members for years. How can 4-H make the best better by using successful methods from outside organizations to boost interest in 4-H and, therefore, increase membership in the modern age?
- 2. How can you help 4-H'ers identify and analyze actions related to a water resource and its use?
- 3. How can 4-H'ers develop the knowledge and skills necessary to address challenges relevant to the study of the environment?
- 4. How can 4-H'ers learn by doing within the community to provide youth with field research experience, technical expertise, and an opportunity to reflect on their own development?
- 5. When nations make decisions about healthy living, what are some of the dilemmas and consequences that might impact people around the world? How can 4-H'ers decrease some of those negative results and/or increase the positive results?

The state Discussion Meet competition will be held at State Field Day on May 28th in Davis. Practice discussion meets are being scheduled for this spring. #### • VERY IMPORTANT - Use New Record Book Manual for 2015-2016

The state 4-H office has released a new 2015-2016 California 4-H Record Book Manual, which is now considered to be the current manual and we are told to discard all previous record book manuals. Please use this manual for your 4-H records this year (2015-2016). A second manual California 4-H Record Book Forms 2015-2016 contains the forms to use with the first 2015-2016 manual. Please use these forms for your records this year. Across the top of each form is the phrase "California 4-H Record Book 2015-2016". DO NOT USE FORMS FROM PRIOR 4-H RECORD BOOK MANUALS. A third record book manual for leaders came out this fall from the state office. We will have these manuals on the county website. The first two manuals are currently on the state website.

There are some changes for 4-H record keeping. Be sure to look at these new manuals as you record your 4-H activities during the year. This year Seniors are asked to include a resume in their record book. The Junior and Teen Leadership Development form has been replaced by the new Leadership Development Form. #### • Leadership Development Report (LDR)

The Junior and Teen Leadership Development Report has been replaced with the Leadership Development Report (LDR), which should be completed by Junior and Teen Leaders in your club. It should also be filled out by your Club Officers and Leadership Project members. The form is also to be used by county All Star Ambassadors, State Ambassadors, Camp Counselors and Exchange Program Participants.

#### • Senior Awards of Excellence - PROJECT WORK (New This Year)

Plaques have been created for the LA County 4-H office where the names of the recipients of the Senior Awards of Excellence are added each year. This year there are again six areas where a Senior member can be recognized for excellence: Leadership, Community Service, Achievement, Healthy Living, S.E.T. (Science, Engineering and Technology) and, the new one this year, Project Work. Senior 4-H members are encouraged to work in these areas. All Seniors who submit their record book in the county competition we will considered for these awards. A Senior can only be awarded a particular Senior Award of Excellence once. Along with their name appearing on the county plaque, the senior 4-H member is also given an individual plaque for the honor. This year the recipients of the 2016 Senior Awards of Excellence will be announced at the County Awards event on October 8, 2016.

#### • Junior/Teen Leader Merit Awards

As part of the county annual record judging, 4-H junior and teen members are invited to have their records evaluated for a Leader Merit Award. This award is to recognize outstanding leadership by Junior and Teen Leaders. A member request on their ID form for the county record book judging form that their records be evaluated for a merit award. A member may only earn a Junior Leader Merit Award once and a Teen Merit Award once.

To be considered for a leader merit award, the 4-H member must be enrolled in a Leadership project and complete the Annual Project Report form for the Leadership project. The member must also complete a Leadership Development Report (LDR) for 2015-2016 to be considered for the award. Both forms are available on the County website under Record Book forms.

#### • State Records Competition

Senior 4-H members are eligible to enter the state record book competition. State competition is focused on selecting 4-H members who have demonstrated outstanding achievement in their 4-H project work. Books are judged against standard criteria. Those books displaying the most outstanding 4-H work, life skills development, and leadership and citizenship development are selected as state medalists and/or state winners. Senior 4-H member (at least 14 years of age and no older than 19 years old by December 31 of the program year for which the book is being entered) are eligible to enter state competition.

Encourage your experienced Senior members to submit their records for the state competition. No additional pages are needed beyond what is submitted to the county competition. Accomplished senior members should be encouraged to start working on their record books now for the 2015-16 competition. Set goals and plan ahead to have a great year in a project area. Districts should consider having workshops on completing record books during the year. There is a lot of good project work being done in LA County, but it is not being entered in the state competitions.

To be eligible to enter the state record book competition, seniors must complete a brief online record book course on the state website and submit a letter of intent to submit your record book to our county office by June 30th, 2016. Mark your calendar in May to remind yourself to take the record book course, so you at least have the option to submit a your record book to state in October.

#### • 2015-2016 Officer Book Forms

All club and Hi-4H officers are encouraged to prepare their officer records for award consideration after the end of the program year. Officers should start working on this now. Officers are encouraged to make their office the best it can be and try for a gold medal. The evaluation of the officer records is done with the Danish system of judging so all officers have the opportunity to earn a Gold medal for their officer work.
