Due to the difficulty of getting help on the committee for the Still Portion of the Extravaganza it will be dropped from the event this year.


The 2017 Extravaganza will be hosted by the Fort Bragg club and held at Dana Gray School in Fort Bragg on May 6, 2017.

WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA ARTICLE

The Ukiah Cemetery is an official Wreaths Across America (WAA) location and will host a wreath-laying ceremony, joining more than 1,000 other locations across the country for National Wreaths Across America Day. This year's date is Saturday December 17th at 9am. Coordinated and led by local 4-H clubs and volunteers, this annual event seeks to further the WAA mission of Remember, Honor, Teach, ensuring that the memory of those who served our country endures.

A dedicated group of 4-H teenagers representing the Ukiah Shamrocks and the Redwood Valley/Calpella 4-H Clubs are planning the third Wreaths Across America event for the Ukiah Cemetery. A few of us researched stories about a veteran buried in the Ukiah Cemetery by talking to their families. We'd love for you to come out to the event at the cemetery, but if you cannot, enjoy this article written by 4-H member Ella Nelson of the Ukiah Shamrock Club. The veteran I have chosen to write a story on is Ernest Eriksen. He is my great, great uncle. He is also the uncle of the man who helped me write this story. Floyd Eriksen. He was the first boy born to Jonas and Ida Eriksen. Ernest was born on June 26, 1892 and died on April 18, 1968. He lived to be 76 years old. He had 5 brothers and 2 sisters and 2 of his brothers were in WWI. There was a 15 year difference between him and his youngest brother Theodore.

He went to war at age 20 and he returned 2 or 3 years later. When he left he was leaving his father who was a rancher in Ukiah. He trained at Fort Lewis in Washington. He fought in World War I in France at the Battle of the Black Forest. He was injured, but not shot. Ernest operated artillery in the army. When he was leaving France, he actually ran into his brother William who was going into the war. When he returned home he had 3 kids, 2 boys and a girl, with his wife Leta Eriksen. He also became a lumberjack. My grandpa explained to me how Ernest didn't talk much about the war. He also told me how hard Ernest worked. In 1938, he moved to Laytonville. Even after he moved my grandpa still saw him guite often. When Ernest Eriksen returned from France there were only 4,000 people living in Ukiah. The number of people in Ukiah is four times that now. One day I hope to be as hardworking as my great great uncle Ernest Emerson Eriksen.

We are continuing to seek donations for wreaths. There are over 2,000 veteran graves at the Ukiah Cemetery. Wreaths are \$15 each. If you'd like to donate money for a wreath for this incredible event, you can by contacting Nadine Boer 707 463-0411 (Ukiah Location Coordinator). And you can request a wreath being placed at a specific grave, if you are not able to attend the ceremony. This program also supports our clubs as for each wreath purchased \$5 comes back to our clubs for our programs. Thank you.

date is fast approaching – Saturday December 17th at 9am at the Ukiah Cemetery. The deadline for wreath donations for this year is November 28th. Our local 4-H youth are committed to this program to place wreaths upon the graves of our local veterans. The mission of the Wreaths Across America is Remember, Honor, Teach. Remember the fallen. Honor those who serve and their families, and Teach the future generations about the sacrifices made to preserve our freedoms. This year, the 4-H committee members were asked to learn about a veteran buried in Ukiah. The following is one such story. Tanner Whetzel of the Ukiah Shamrocks 4-H and sophomore at Ukiah High School researched Al Hardie a veteran buried at our local cemetery by speaking with Mr. Hardie's family here in Ukiah.

There is estimated 2,000 veterans in the Russian River Cemetery, that's 2,000 people who risked their lives throughout all of our nation's wars. There are graves dating back all the way to the Spanish American war in our local cemetery. Each grave has a person connected to it and each person has a story connected to them. The story I will tell today is about Lieutenant Albert Minton Hardie Jr. Al Hardie was a normal citizen just like you and me, born June 24, 1922. After high school he attended UC Berkeley and was going to be a lawyer like his father, then America was thrown in WWII and like most young men in the 40's Al joined the Military. He was in the Army Air Force and went into bombardier school. While in bombardier school he was exceptionally good and was then assigned to be the teacher for the bombardier school. He was a teacher for a couple of years then he was sent overseas as a bombardier. While he was still teaching he fell in love with a girl named Irene and married her. Very soon after he got married he was sent to the South Pacific to fight for his country. As stated above he was a bombardier for the Air Force and was for his military career. Towards the end of the war one of his friends needed one last mission to go home, so Al gave him his. It turns out the mission Al gave to his friend to be sent home was the dropping of the atomic bomb on Japan's cities

After WWII AI went into the reserves, but then got asked to be in the Korean War years later. He was in service for the Korean War for three years then got out. After both wars he got to live the American Dream, raise a family, and enjoy life. Al moved back to Ukiah in 1953 because he had roots in the Ukiah Valley. Al's mother was part of the Romer's family. Al and his wife raised three children; Bob Hardie, Ann Arneson, and Janie Leonard. Al had many jobs including stock broker, car salesman and pear rancher. Al passed away March 9th, 2013. Al's story is just one out of the 2,000 veterans that lie in our cemetery. This shows how much one American can do in his/her lifetime. I encourage you next time you visit a cemetery and see those veterans graves don't look at them as just a gravestone, but as men or women who gave their lives and respect to their country. I also encourage you to take that veteran's name and research them. You'll be surprised what you will find.

4-H State Cooking Competition - at the California State Fair JULY 25th

July may seem far way, but it's the season for cooking! 4-H members 9 and older are invited to participate in the 4-H State Cooking Competition at the California State Fair. In preparation for this event we suggest Project Leaders use the Cooking 101 curriculum (available here: Cooking 101 curriculum). Teams will consist of 3 youth members and will compete at a self-selected level of Beginner, Intermediate, or Advanced levels. See division descriptions below.

Divisions:

Beginner: Beginner teams will prepare one healthy main entree dish. Beginner teams will use predetermined and preapproved recipes and are not required to incorporate a secret ingredient. Each team will have 15 minutes to gather items from the pantry, and then 60 minutes to cook their dish. A panel of judges will taste And determine the winning team!

Intermediate: Intermediate teams must prepare a healthy three course meal consisting of an appetizer, entrée, and dessert using provided recipes. They are required to incorporate a secret ingredient. Each team will have 15 minutes to gather foods from the pantry, and then 60 minutes to cook a three course meal. A panel of judges will taste all courses prepared and determine the winning team!

Advanced: Advanced teams must prepare an appetizer, main course, and dessert without the use of recipes. Cookbooks are not allowed for Advanced competitors. All dishes must incorporate a secret ingredient that will be revealed at the competition. Each team will have 15 minutes to prep and then 60 minutes to cook a three course meal. A panel of judges will taste all courses prepared and determine the Champion!

Notes: Each team may bring one tool to use during competition. Each team must wash their dishes and return them after competition.
