# Please volunteer to help with outreach at the County Fair!

For the last few years, El Sereno 4-H's Rabbit and Cavy Project has led a Service Learning Project to develop the Small Animal Education Area at Fair. Last year during the public hours there were crowds of kids trying to get turns to pet the animals. Parents and teens talked to visitors about 4-H, but it was so crowded they only spoke to maybe one in twenty people. At least three new families joined 4-H after talking to us at the Education Area - but we missed hundreds more who might have joined 4-H if we'd managed to talk to them.

This year, we plan to improve outreach, by creating more activities and by becoming more effective at talking with visitors. Our service learning project organizes the set-up of the Education Area, but it is for EVERYONE to share and help with. We need as many people as possible to participate so we can talk to as many visitors as possible!

- If you have an animal at Fair, or if you are good with animals, please come to the booth to help supervise the animals and answer questions.
- But we don't just need the animal exhibitors we need an army of adults and youth who know about 4-H and can hand out flyers and explain what 4-H is and how to join. If you can spare an hour, two hours, or an afternoon or evening, you can talk to families whose children would become 4-Hers next year!

In addition, this year we will organize demonstrations and contests using a PA system, so there are more activities for the public to watch. During these activities we will use the microphone to explain what 4-H is all about.

- Anyone with a small animal can volunteer to do a demo it can be of anything, e.g., a demo of showmanship, or bring up an animal and talk about its species, its breed, and information about the breed. It can be a long demo, or just five minutes. It can be done on your own, or a pair, or a group. We want to fill the afternoons and evenings with interesting demos!
- A project can work together to do some demos, or it can be as simple as showing your animal and having a friend ask questions about it with the microphone.
- We will create a schedule nearer to Fair, so anyone who wants to do a demo can sign up for a slot. If you have an idea for a demo with your project that needs more organizing than just signing up, please email us at nj call@pacbell.net, and we can work out a time slot for you.

We are organizing a Cavy Costume Contest and a Rabbit Costume Contest during the public times.

- We would love for a Poultry Project to volunteer to organize a Poultry Costume Contest too! If your project could organize a costume contest, please email us!
- We'll send out more info about these fun events nearer the time, but we would love everyone to think about entering and making cool costumes, so we have a great event for the public to watch.

*Imagine*: Thousands of people came through the Small Animal Barn last year, and we managed to talk to less than one in twenty. Please consider giving a few hours of your time on August 3, 4, 5, or 6<sup>th</sup> at The Fairgrounds, 344 Tully Road, San Jose. If we have an army of 4-H volunteers in the Small Animal Barn during the public hours, we can reach thousands more people who might then join 4-H and next year, they will be exhibitors at Fair, not spectators. This way, 4-H and our Fair will get even bigger and better next year!

This was the first year of the Rolling Hills 4-H Music Project. It was a great success. The 4-H Western Heritage Project combines a comprehensive study of the Old West with the fastest growing shooting sports discipline in the world – western action shooting. In this project 4-H members and adult leaders experience the lifestyles and cultures of the Old West from the period of around 1860-1900 through a living history approach to learning while instilling the concepts of gun safety and personal responsibility. Members dress in Old West clothing, shoot replica firearms of the frontier period, and expand their knowledge of U.S. history. The California State Finals were held May 7-8 in Winton, CA - where qualifying 4-H members from counties all over the state came to compete. The members competed in a U.S. History Test (1860-1900), a vintage Firearms Identification Test, a timed shoot using, historically accurate revolvers, lever action rifles, and a double barrel coach style shotgun. They were also tasked with assuming a persona from the given time period and be interviewed as that person.: Results: Thomas Aquino, Pacheco Pass 4-H, 2nd overall California High Point, 1st overall Place in History Exam. Troy Chambers, Pacheco Pass 4-H finished top 10.

After the interviews, the panel selected seven interviewees who demonstrated excellence in their 4-H experiences and would be great representatives of Santa Clara County 4-H.

## **Changes for 4-H online Enrollment Effective July 1**

It's nearing the close of the 2016-17 4-H Program year. Looking toward enrollment for the coming year starting July 1, 2017, there are some exciting developments. The biggest change is that **Health History Forms** will now be part of the **4honline.com** enrollment system. When a member enrolls, or re-enrolls – they will fill out the Health History Form on line. When the youth or adult volunteer registers in advance for an event, those forms will be accessible for the nurse or event chairperson. When a paper version is required, a member may easily print it from the 4-H online system. Oh, the time this will save! Another advantage of the

Health History Form being imbedded in 4honline is that the health history may be kept current. If there is a change in a member's health, such as an allergy – the member or parent may update the form online. More information and links will be coming your way in an email toward the end of June. Be sure to re-enroll as soon as possible after July1, so you don't miss a thing in 4-H.





# Wear it with pride! The 4-H Uniform Hat

The 4-H hat is a source of pride for the California 4-H Youth Development Program, as we are the only state to have such a 4-H club hat. Many members use the hat to display their achievement pins and to wear during fairs. A 4-H hat is NOT required for membership in the California 4-H Youth Development Program or for participation in any 4-H activity, event, or occasion.

### **Guidelines:**

Official green 4-H hat branded with the University of California, Agriculture and Natural Resources (UC ANR) and the 4-H clover logo mark. These can be purchased through <u>Leslie Carman 4-H Supplies</u>.

Youth who are currently senior level members may continue to use their white hat for the remainder of their 4-H career. Senior members may also convert to the green hat as they choose.

It is expected that by **July 1, 2020**, all members will be wearing the UC ANR 4-H branded green hats. Stripes and pins are available from your club leader or enrollment

Where do I put my recognition and achievement items? Stars, stripes, and medals:

Left side of hat - All-star, platinum, gold, silver, or bronze stars in front. Members may "cascade" the stars. Behind the stars are placed the junior/teen leader emblems and the Hi 4-H patch (in that order).

Right side of hat - year completion pin and stripe is earned for each year completed in 4-H. Officer title pins and 100% Attendance pins should align with the year the pin was earned.

### 4H Hat Guidelines, cont...

Note: If a member earns more year stripes than can fit on the right

side of the hat, they may "wrap around" their stripes and continue onto the left side of the hat.

To align the year completion pin and stripe recognition items to the <u>Steps to Success in 4-H</u>, for meeting project completion requirements members will receive:

- 1) A "Year Completion Pin" that is specific to their age level. Four pins will be available:
- a) Primary
- b) Junior
- c) Intermediate
- d) Senior
- 2) A year stripe

White stripes for all members or gold stripes in years where they serve as a junior or teen leader. (Members do not need to complete the whole Record Book for this criterion to be met.)

Year pins are fastened to the hat above the stripe, starting with the primary pins next to the 4-H clover. The 100% attendance pin, if it is part of your club's procedures and is earned, should be fastened to the hat below the stripe of the year that the pin was earned.

- Either side Medals may be worn on either side of the hat, or placing them on the left is recommended.
- Note: No other pin or ribbon should be worn on the hat other than 4-H related items. The hat should reflect the dignity of the 4-H Youth Development Program. Some items that should not be worn on the hat include buttons, fair medals, convention badges or other regalia.

# Why 4-H?

4-H allowed me to discover a passion that eventually influenced my career path. Before I joined 4-H at age 12, I was just like any other city kid from Silicon Valley. I was oblivious to how our food ended up at the supermarket. Raising pigs and beef cattle through 4-H sparked my interest in agriculture and an appreciation for all of the dedication that goes into bringing fresh food to our dinner tables.

The experience of raising market animals for the Santa Clara County Fair built character, instilling values such as commitment, dedication, hard work, and leadership along the way. A formerly shy guy eventually went on to become junior leader of his club's swine project and president of his club.

My experiences in 4-H led me to select a college with a well-known agriculture program. In 2014, I graduated with a degree in Agricultural Business from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. I am now working in the banking industry in Paso Robles helping to finance local farmers and ranchers. The agricultural products I work with are varied and include wine grapes, beef cattle, strawberries, various vegetables, and tree nuts. Why 4-H? My passion, discovered in 4-H – led me to this career.

### High School Seniors and College Students – Have you applied for a scholarship?

8 different scholarships are available to apply through the online link below.

Applications must be submitted no later than August 6th, 2017, 11:59 p.m.

All required information must be included with the application to be considered.

**The candidate for any 4-H scholarship must be**: A high school senior, graduate, or equivalent who is already enrolled in or accepted to an institution of higher education. Institutions of higher education include accredited vocational schools, colleges or universities.

- Enrolled in the California 4-H Youth Development Program at the time of high school graduation or equivalent, such as receiving a General Education Diploma (GED)
- Enrolled or planning to enroll in at least half of the full-time course load as defined by the applicant's institution.
- Not older than 25 as of December 31st of the application year.

Applicants may apply for multiple scholarships but are only eligible to receive one scholarship per year. Previous scholarship recipients may reapply.
