4-H Hat





Left side of hat - All-star, platinum, gold, silver, or bronze stars in front. Members may "cascade" the stars. Behind the stars are placed the junior/teen leader emblems and the Hi 4-H patch (in that order).

Right side of hat - year completion pin and stripe is earned for each year completed in 4-H. Officer title pins and 100% Attendance pins should align with the year the pin was earned.

Note: No other pin or ribbon should be worn on the hat other than 4-H related items. The hat should reflect the dignity of the 4-H Youth Development Program. Some items that should not be worn on the hat include buttons, fair medals, convention badges or other regalia.

1. Official green 4-H Hat

- 2. A plain white shirt with a collar. Any length of sleeve.
- 3. White pants (all fabric types are acceptable). Each fair may have other options, please check the entry book for more details.
- 4. A 4-H tie or scarf worn with the collared white shirt. The tie and scarf are both worn under the collar. Any member can wear either the scarf or the tie, whichever the member is most comfortable wearing.

Make sure your whites are clean, shirt tucked in and wear a belt if you have one.

California 4-H Dress Guidelines 7/2015

University of California Agriculture and Natural Resources

Making a Difference for California

Proper dress and grooming for an occasion is a matter of exercising good judgment. Dressing well for all 4-H occasions is a skill that individuals should gain knowledge of and value its significance. Adults, members and 4-H staff should encourage this important lesson.

General Guidelines

4-H encourages youth and adults to express their individuality within the parameters of the below general guidelines. All clothing shall be neat, clean, acceptable in repair and appearance, and should be worn as appropriate for 4-H events and activities. Articles of clothing that display profanity, products or slogans that promote tobacco, alcohol, drugs and sex are prohibited. Items of clothing that expose bare midriffs, cleavage (front or back), undergarments or that are transparent (see-through) are prohibited. Clothing and footwear should be worn that is appropriate for the activity performed and the terrain the activity is performed in. Additional clothing considerations/restrictions may apply for safety reasons (see 4-H Safety Manual and/or the adult in charge of the event or activity). These general guidelines apply to 4-H members, adult volunteers, parents/guardians and program participants.

Time & Location: Last Tuesday of the Month at Chualar Elementary School at 6:30 PM - Except December & July, those meetings are held at the Aguilar Barn in Chualar Canyon. No meetings are held in June or November.

Participation Requirements: Must attend 80% of monthly club meetings (8 out of 10). Must also attend 80% of project meetings to be eligible to exhibit any livestock at a fair. At least 1 adult shall accompany a member, 15 or younger, or any first year member to all general meetings, unless otherwise approved by the Community Leader. If you have a livestock entry for any fair, you must also complete a second 4-H project and have a non-livestock entry in the fair. Otherwise, all members must be enrolled in one project.

Absences: If you are going to miss a club meeting, please call or email Angie or Hollie (community leaders) prior to the meeting. More details on absences are in the Club Bylaws.

Parent Volunteers: We ask each family to have parent participation during the year or to be an enrolled Project Leader. Parents/Guardians of first year members are expected to attend and observe 1 county council monthly meeting instead of volunteering or being a project leader.

Record Books: Our club is committed to the education 4-H Record books provide. See the club rules or livestock policies for more information. Clover bud members are exempt.

Re-Enrollment: Club Enrollment volunteer is Michelle Lindley (831-679-2412 or michellelindo@yahoo.com) Re-reenrollment forms are handed out in July and due by our August meeting.

4-H Attire: 4-H attire is a white shirt, with a 4-H tie for boys and a green 4-H scarf for girls and a 4-H hat. White or black pants are also part of the attire. Each Fair sets its own "uniform" requirement for our members. Read the rule book.


