Helpful Hints for a Successful Club Experience

As a UC 4-H parent/guardian you can contribute to your child having a successful 4-H club experience by doing some of the following:

- Get to know your club leader(s) and project leaders
- Attend local club/project meetings with your child whenever possible
- Ask for a copy of your club's bylaws and constitution or operating procedures and yearly calendar of events
- Encourage your child to complete project work and to meet deadlines

Supporting Your Child's Club

- Serve as a project leader. If you have an activity or hobby that you have a passion for and would like to share, then you could become a project leader teaching something you love to youth
- Assume a specific club responsibility such as helping with member registration, working with a committee of youth to plan an activity, or helping a club officer with her/his responsibilities
- Adults helping in any role can be enrolled as a UC 4-H adult volunteer. Adult volunteers fill out an application and pay the accident/sickness insurance fee and are also covered under the University's general liability insurance. Speak to your club leader or the county Extension office about how to become a UC 4-H adult volunteer

What is the 4-H Leaders Job?

To help 4-H members learn specific project skills.

• Members have fun with projects while "learning by doing." Youth remember better if they actually experience something and have an opportunity for some "hands-on learning."

Learning takes place within the learner - it is not something done to the learner.

• We encourage skills that will be useful to the youth in the future. We help each member develop good habits, experiment with new ideas, and practice problem-solving skills. By doing this, we help them become self-directed, productive, and contributing members of society.

To teach 4-H members how to think, not what to think.

• We help develop creative thinking in young people by giving them a chance to make decisions on their own. They'll learn from their own choices.

To recognize and encourage each 4-H member so they feel noticed and important.

• The most significant recognition that can be given to members is praise, attention, or compliments – letting them know they are important and what they have done is worthwhile.

Are You Going to the Fair?

Fairs provide opportunities for members to exhibit the best of their project work from the past year and see how their skills have grown. Fairs also share with the community what UC 4-H activities are taking place in their area.

their area. Each fair is governed by a set of rules that should be carefully reviewed by UC 4-H staff. Most fairs are not run by UC 4-H. Entering UC 4-H projects in county, district, and state fairs is the responsibility of the UC 4-H members. They should contact their project leaders to obtain necessary forms, help with completion of forms, and required signatures. Members are responsible for turning in their entries on time. It is the member's responsibility to find out the rules of a fair and follow them, while representing UC 4-H and following UC 4-H Code of Conduct http://4h.ucanr.edu/files/211114.pdf



Animal Ownership Requirements

All 4-H members who are enrolled or plan to enroll in a 4-H animal project and who wish to show or exhibit their animal project(s) at a fair, exposition, sponsored shows, e.g., 4-H shows or other sponsored shows, please review the timeframes of animal ownership and supervision you will need to meet for eligibility. Each category is outlined below. Project leaders, sharing these timeframes with members will help ensure that youth in animals projects will be prepared for the 4-H year and fair season each year. See Ch. 7 of the policy handbook, IV. Fairs, Expositions, and Other Sponsored Shows for more information online at http://4h.ucanr.edu/Resources/Policies/.

- Poultry must be owned and supervised for not less than 30 consecutive days and be enrolled in the project for not less than 60 consecutive days.
- Rabbits must be owned and supervised for not less than 30 consecutive days and be enrolled in the project for not less than 60 consecutive days.
- Feeder and breeding animals must be owned and supervised for not less than 30 consecutive days and be enrolled in the project for not less than 60 consecutive days.
- Market sheep, swine, veal and goats must be owned and supervised for not less than 60 consecutive days.
- Market beef must be owned and supervised for not less than 120 consecutive days.
- Horses must be owned/leased and supervised for not less than 120 consecutive days. Male foals may be shown by 4-H members, but yearling and older stallions are ineligible as 4-H projects. The age of the horse shall be computed on the basis of a calendar year starting on January 1 of the year foaled; it is a weanling during the calendar year in which foaled, and a yearling during the first calendar year following its foaling date, regardless of year foaled.
- Llamas & Alpacas must be owned/leased and supervised for not less than 120 consecutive days.

For any project, The 4-H member must have participated in at least six or more hours of instruction led or approved by their certified 4-H project leader.

- 1. The Fair entry form requires the signature of the 4-H project leader verifying that the exhibit has been part of the 4-H member's project and that the member has completed the project as stated above and has met the additional requirements below for Fair participation in 4-H divisions.
- 2. To exhibit livestock and/or horse at the Tehama District Fair, the 4-H member:
 - Must be 9 years of age and not yet 19 years of age on January 1 of the program year.
 - Must have owned and cared for the animal prior to the Fair for a minimum of:

30 days for rabbit and poultry and breeding livestock 60 days for sheep, goats, and swine 120 days for beef & horse

Club Participation

(for 4-H club programs only)

Be a member in good standing.

No attendance requirement.

100% attendance pin for perfect club meeting attendance.

Requirements to Exhibit at Fair

Complete Project Completion requirements.

Meet requirements as set by the county or fair.

Event Participation

Participation in county, sectional, state and national 4-H events is open to all 4-H members in good standing.

There may be eligibility requirements established by the event planning committee.

Incentives and Recognition

There are many ways to earn recognition in 4-H.

Awards can be earned based on project and club attendance and work.

Awards can be earned for participating at county, sectional, state and national 4-H levels.

Awards earned will be governed by county and state 4-H Incentives and Recognition Committees.

*Primary members, youth aged 5 to 8 years, do not complete the APR. Record keeping is not required for project completion.

**Primary members receive a year stripe and pin for participation in a project. Project completion is not required.

**Junior/Teen leaders receive a gold stripe and year pin for completing the Leadership Development Report (LDR). Junior/teen leaders are not required to actively participate in the project in which they are a leader.
