- New programs focused on college and career readiness and agricultural workforce development.


















## **Ethics Training**

# Animal Ownership & Supervision Requirements

For 4-H members who are enrolled or plan to enroll in a 4-H animal project and who wish to show or exhibit their animal project(s) at a fair, exposition, sponsored shows, e.g., 4-H shows or other sponsored shows:

- Rabbits must be owned and supervised for not less than 30 consecutive days and be enrolled in the project for not less than 60 consecutive days.
- Feeder and breeding animals must be owned and supervised for not less than 30 consecutive days and be enrolled in the project for not less than 60 consecutive days.
- Market sheep, swine, veal and goats - must be owned and supervised for not less than 60 consecutive days.
- Market beef must be owned and supervised for not less than 120 consecutive days.
- Horses must be owned/leased and supervised for not less than 120 consecutive days. Male foals may be shown by 4-H members, but yearling and older stallions are ineligible as 4-H projects. The age of the horse shall be computed on the basis of a calendar year starting on January 1 of the year foaled; it is a weanling during the calendar year in which foaled, and a yearling during the first calendar year following its foaling date, regardless of year foaled.
- Llamas & Alpacas must be owned/leased and supervised for not less than 120 consecutive days.



The Mendocino-Lake 4-H Summer Camp is a week-long camp filled with fun and exciting adventures that are sure to be remembered for years to come. All 4-H Members ages 9-13 may participate in camp as a camper. Members ages 12-13 also have the opportunity to attend camp as a Counselor-In-Training.

Members ages 14-18 years of age have the opportunity to attend camp as a Counselor, Lead Counselor or Dean and members ages 16-18 may serve as a Director or Ambassador.

During camp, campers will participate in daily educational workshops, campfire and other activities. Some of the workshops that have been offered at camp have been: Archery, Shooting Sports, Hiking, Water Activities, Sports, Arts & Crafts, Low Ropes, photography and much much more!!

The Mendocino-Lake 4-H Summer Camp is sure to bring exciting experiences, lifelong friends and the chance to learn fun new activities!!


Presentations also helped me to earn my Platinum Star Ranking in five years.
