youth members who participated in camping and exchange trips. We are very thankful for their time in our program and appreciate all they have given to so many youth of our community. Thank you Gary and



Youth and volunteers spend a substantial amount of time using social media websites as well as email. Examples of social media include blogs, social networking (e.g., Facebook, Myspace, Google+, Twitter), or video and photograph sharing (e.g., YouTube, Flickr, Picasa). Social media is starting to be a critical way to reach young people, enhance communication, and promote education and positive youth development outcomes. 4-H club or project presence on a social media and emails must be used for educational, informational, and/or communication/group coordination purposes in furtherance or support of the 4-H mission and direction. When thinking of starting a 4-H social media account, please remember the followina:

- **Notify the county 4-H Office** if your club or project has or wishes to establish a social media site.
- Upon request, 4-H program staff must be added as an administrator.
- An appointed 4-H adult volunteer must be added as an administrator.
- It is recommended that youth members work in partnership with a 4-H adult volunteer or older teen mentor in the development and maintenance of the site.


Quality Assurance & Ethics

Beginning January 1, 2019, the Fairs and Exposition Branch (F&E) will require all California Fairs County, Citrus, and District Agricultural Associations) junior livestock (large and small animal) exhibitors to annually participate in a F&E approved Quality Assurance and Ethics Awareness training (YQCA). The YQCA online/in-person program is approved to fulfill the F&E approved Quality Assurance and Ethics Awareness training requirement. Please note, the YQCA program is not meant to replace the efforts of fairs that wish to continue their own youth quality assurance and ethics efforts.

The YQCA online/in-person training program is mainly geared toward those exhibitors with market projects, 9 years and older, but is required by all small and large livestock exhibitors, which includes those with only breeding projects. At this time, 5-8 year olds are not required to participate in the training.

What does this mean for 4-H?

4-H does not have any management responsibilities regarding the YQCA. The fairs are responsible for letting exhibitors know about the requirement and when the training needs to be completed. 4-H staff are not responsible to notify those who need to complete the training, lead any in-person trainings or verify certificates. 4-H Makes

Maker, making, maker space, maker faire – we seem to hear a lot about the maker movement these days. While the term in its various forms is ubiquitous, it solicits several valid questions, including: What is the significance of this movement and how does it relate to the 4-H program (if at all)? But before we begin pondering these questions, lets define the term "maker." In its simplest context a maker is anyone who makes stuff. Although there is a tendency to associate makers and making with technology-based pursuits, these terms can and do encompass both low and high-tech creative realms and the makers that inhabit them. Many of us of know these so-called makers by a different name, but one thing is for sure; hackers, coders, hobbyists, crafters, designers, do-it-yourselfers and everyone in between, are embracing the term of maker and finding a sense of belonging and comradery in making and the maker movement.

So, what makes this new and different? After all, we as humans having been making and creating since our earliest days in existence. Well, a lot of the momentum behind the maker movement lies, not so much in the act of making itself, but in how people engage, connect and share their making experiences. Today's technology-driven society, with its rich environment of social media and instant digital communication, has provided a catalyst for impassioned creators to share knowledge and ideas in new and exciting ways. All this has culminated in what might be described as an open-source community of practice. It is here that traditional boundaries between interests disappear and individual sparks are discovered, explored and shared.

In 4-H, much of what we do centers on creating a learning environment where youth can identify sparks, explore knowledge, share ideas, develop skills and pursue their passion. Sound familiar? Objectively, the 4-H Program and the maker movement were made for one another. For over 100 years the 4-H program has embodied the maker spirit through its hands-on approach to problem solving and inherently creative activities. Nearly any 4-H project can incorporate elements of making. All one really needs to do is be intentional about making the connections. The youth are already engaged in pursuing a topic of interest that allows them to explore and acquire knowledge, while on the road to mastering specific skill sets; however, to fully realize their potential, youth must be empowered to own the creative process and breath life into their unique ideas. As Dale Dougherty, the Founder of Make: Magazine encourages, we "should look to the maker movement for tips on how to create an ecosystem of talent, connections, and learning that will lead to a truly innovative economy and society." Given that insight, we could argue that 4-H youth are poised to become the next generation of leaders, problem-solvers, innovators, scientists, engineers and makers.

Having established that the maker movement is both relevant and compatible with the 4-H Program, there is one question left to answer: How does 4-H become involved in the maker movement? The truth is, 4-H has always been involved in the maker movement, so don't hesitate to adopt the moniker of maker. Then, seek out other makers and embrace the sense of belonging and comradery found amongst your fellow makers – maker spaces and maker events are a great way to do that. Here in Far Northern California we are fortunate to have a couple of maker events that are gaining traction. The 2019 Maker Showcase will be held at the Tehama District Fairgrounds on May 2nd – 5th, with applications due on March 25th. This is a great opportunity to host a hands-on workshop, give a maker demonstration, organize a



performance, or just share your passion. There will also be opportunities for youth and volunteers to help with the "4-H Makes" activity booth being organized as a part of the event. Additionally, the 2nd Shasta County Mini Maker Faire was held in October of 2018 and is expected to return for a 3rd effort in 2020. Still need some help with ideas? **Contact Nate W. Youth Leadership Opportunities

One goal of UC 4-H is to help members develop into confident, effective leaders. UC 4-H youth leaders use their knowledge, skills, and influence to establish relationships with people and help others meet goals. Many leadership opportunities are offered through the UC 4-H program, and members are encouraged to become involved at all levels, including club, county, state, and national.

• Junior & Teen Leaders at the project level

Junior and Teen Leaders assist the project leader in teaching and helping other members of the project. They receive special patches and pins for their 4-H hat. Check with your club's project leaders for opportunities.

Club Committees

Clubs may have committees for various reasons such as setup/take down monthly meetings, club judging day, fundraising, events, community service, and others. Find out from your Club Leader what committees are available.

• Club Chairperson

The chairperson is responsible for the organization and facilitation of their committee. Some clubs hold elections for chairperson positions. Other ways are to be appointed, be the founder of the committee or volunteer for an ongoing project your club already has in place.

Club Officer

Some clubs have elected officers that provide leadership for the club and plan and carry out club meetings. Generally, the executive board consists of a President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, Reporter, and others. Positions available vary by club. CA 4-H Archery Match

The California 4-H State Archery Match hosted by Nevada County is happening soon. Entries are due to Nevada County by **April 20, 2019**. New this year: Entries paid with council check, club check, or money order. Age brackets are Juniors (9-10), Intermediates (11-13), and Seniors (14+). Categories include Longbow, Recurve, and the Compound Bow. Important message from Jeanette Oliver, postal shoot coordinator, about targets, as sent to archery leaders: I would encourage all of you to take an inventory of your unused/ reusable 80cm FITA postal targets. I know of a few clubs who actually did not use the targets I shipped them for 2018. Shipping costs for these big targets are ridiculously high so IF your club doesn't need targets shipped for 2019 - the entry fee will be \$4.00 per distance instead of \$5.00. If your club doesn't have enough targets on hand to complete your postal shoot - the cost will be \$5.00 per distance and you will receive one target for every \$5.00 entry fee. This is an "all or none" deal. I can't charge \$4.00 per entry and still ship a small number of targets because you only need a few. If you would like to purchase extra targets from a local source please make sure they are the 80cm FITA 10 ring targets. Creating a Safer Camp

If you haven't already heard, we have made the difficult decision to postpone our Tehama Youth Camp until Summer 2020. Given the rise of catastrophic wildfires in California and the increasing likelihood that we may find ourselves in a situation that necessitates evacuation sometime in the near future, we have decided to take the 2019 year to work on creating a safer camp environment. Last month, Ashton attended an American Camp Association workshop that focused on lessons learned from recent wildfires in California. This yielded some eye opening, but incredibly useful information that prompted a closer look at the safety of our site and existing program. This has resulted in several, immediate projects that we plan to undertake in the next year: 1) evaluate and revise our existing safety plan and evacuation procedures; 2) seek funding for and conduct fuels reduction operations at the site; 3) assess and address any other safety concerns that exist due to deferred maintenance, etc. Unfortunately, this will take more time than we have in the current year, so please stick with us as we work to protect our most valuable commodity – our youth. We are also working on some camp related activities and trainings to keep the camp spirit alive in the interim, so stay tuned.
