

The brown marmorated stink bug (BMSB) is an invasive stink bug species causing significant economic damage to multiple crops in much of the United States. BMSB infestation in California crops was first reported in the Modesto area (Stanislaus County) in 2016 in peaches, and in 2017 in almonds.

Since then, we observed BMSB infestation in several peach and almond orchards in the northern San Joaquin Valley, with severe fruit and nut damage in some orchards.

In this meeting, we will:

- provide information to identify the bug and the feeding damage
- biology and host crops in the area
- detection and monitoring tools
- ways to prevent and control this bug in conjunction with other insect pests in almonds.
