Clover Safe Notes: #3 Working Safely with Cattle

Working Safely with Cattle

Understanding how cattle perceive and react to their surroundings provides guidance on working safely with cattle as follows:

- When working with cattle, wear appropriate personal protective equipment such as steel toed boots with nonskid soles, long pants, gloves, eye protection, and a shirt. If cattle movement is cause airborne dust in the work area, use a dust mask.
- Learn the flight zone distance(s) of the cattle you work with.
- Before turning a new steer loose in a pasture, think about how you will catch him safely.
- Always approach cattle within their field of vision. Move at a deliberate pace and make the animal(s) aware of your approach as you enter their flight zone.
- Be award of signs of fear or aggression in cattle, such as pawing or snorting, a raised tail or ears, panicky behavior, and bellowing. Avoid frightened/spooked or aggressive cattle.
- Assure you have an escape route when working nearby cattle.
- Where possible, use a blocking chute when clipping or washing cattle.
- Making loud noises or moving quickly may startle cattle
- Be careful around young animals. Try not to get between a new calf and its mother.
- Due to their aggressive temperament, take extra precautions when working with bulls.
- Promptly report any injuries from cattle to your group leader, parent, or guardian.
- Always wash your hand with soap and water after touching cattle or any other animal.

Received new 4-H recognition and achievement pin for your hat and don't know how to put them on?

LEFT SIDE OF HAT



- All-star, platinum, gold, silver, or bronze starts in front. You can "cascade" the stars.
- Place the junior/ teen leader emblems and the Hi 4-H patch (in that order) behind the stars.

RIGHT SIDE OF HAT



- Stripes earned for each year completed in 4-H.
- Year completion pin placed above the stripe of the year earned, starting with primary pins next to the clover logo.
- Officer pins—align with year earned.
- 100% Attendance pins—place below the stripes of the year the pin was earned.

Note: If a member earns more year stripes than can fit on the right side of the hat, they may "wrap around" their stripes and continue onto the left side of the hat. For more information on your 4-H hat, visit: http://4h.ucanr.edu/resources/member resources/uniform/california 4-h hat/.

- Medals may be worn on eithr side of the hat. Placing them on the left is recommended.
- NOTE: No other pin or ribbon should be worn on the hat other than 4-Hd related items. The hat should reflect the dignity of the 4-H Youth Development Program. Some items that should not be worn on the hat include buttons, fair medals, convention badges or other regalia.

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
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
