Dear UC ANR 4-H Families:

As you all know, national, state and local agencies have been implementing various measures to reduce the rate and risk of community spread of COVID-19. Many California counties, businesses, and school districts have implemented remote working protocols and a number of California counties have issued shelter in place orders.

We wanted to update you on protective measures being taken by the University of California, including all UC ANR locations. Last week, all UC campuses, the Office of the President and UC ANR offices in Davis, Berkeley and Oakland began implementing telecommute and limited on-site operations protocols. This week, all UC Agriculture and Natural Resources county offices, research and extension centers and statewide programs are implementing similar protocols. By Friday, March 20, all UC ANR employees will be working remotely, with the exception of designated essential on-site staff/academics.

Being mindful of official guidance concerning social distancing, all UC ANR functions, events, activities, meetings, etc. will also either be postponed, cancelled or moved to Zoom video conferencing through April 7, or until the guidance is modified. This directive also includes all volunteer-led youth or adult programming, meetings, or gatherings.

During this telecommute status, I want to emphasize that we are still working and available to assist our partners and stakeholders across the state. Critical research projects are being maintained and program delivery is taking place online. There is no impact to your ability to connect with us by email, phone or Zoom video conferencing. We will work to find solutions to support our stakeholders throughout any possible scenario that the virus may bring.

We know that every organization we serve is facing unprecedented challenges at this time. UC ANR is happy to provide free access to Zoom video conferencing tools and training. 4-H & COVID-1-COVID-19 & Animal Husbandry

In response to questions we are receiving, here is some pertinent information regarding caring for and raising your animals within the context of COVID-19.

Raising your 4-H animal can help you keep a bit of normal in your life during these times of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19). The bond you share with your animal can help you feel happy, relaxed, less stressed and less anxious and is good for your health and wellness. (National Institute of Health; Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

- Regarding the Coronavirus and animals:
 - In the United States, there is no evidence to suggest that any animals, including pets, livestock, or wildlife, might be a source of COVID-19 infection at this time. However, because all animals can carry germs that can make people sick, it's always a good idea to practice healthy habits around pets and other animals. [from CDC Animals and Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)]
 - The World Health Organization, Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, and Center for Disease Control and Prevention indicate that pets and other domestic animals are not considered at risk for contracting COVID-19 or transmitting the virus that causes COVID-19 (also known as 2019-nCoV). (from American Veterinary Medical Association FAQ document)
 - The same guidance to reduce COVID-19 spread also is good practice for raising and caring for your animal, including washing your hands on a regular basis.
- Best Practices for 4-H Animal Projects
 - When 4-H Clubs have multiple families picking up their project animals from one location, please consider staggering each family's pick-up by 15 to 20 minutes.
 - In the case that all the 4-H Project animals are housed in one facility, a schedule should be created so families may sign up for a specific time slot to tend to their animals and facilitate social distancing.
 - Please remember not to financially overextend yourself for purchasing animals and feed. We do not know if Fairs will go forward this year.
 - As soon as we receive information from the Fairs, we will pass on that information to the 4-H Community.

We are going to implement the "**4-H Way**" by going with a new plan to get our mission of learning for our 4-H youth. We are working on placing resources on the 4-H county website for project online learning materials and ideas for 4-H projects.
