Finding a Certified Arborist

What's wrong with my tree (citrus, fruit, shade, palm, coniferous, evergreen, deciduous)? At the Helpline we get some form of this question at least once a month. The problem can be pests, diseases, mechanical damage, or cultural issues. Often the homeowner doesn't even know the type of tree. Through a process of diagnostic questions and photographs the Helpline workers endeavor to find answers. Still there are times when it is impossible to give a definite solution for the problem. This is when we suggest contacting an arborist.

What is an arborist? The common, simple definition is tree surgeon. But arborists, also known as arboriculturists, are so much more. Arboriculture is the cultivation, management, and study of individual trees, shrubs, vines and other perennial woody plants in dendrology (scientific study of trees) and horticulture. Arborists provide a number of services: tree identification, tree variety and placement recommendations, pruning (tree surgery), safety determination, tree removal, emergency tree care, planting, plant health care, disease diagnosis, treatment and prevention, the control of pests, and consultations on construction sites to save trees.

Certified Arborists have achieved a high level of knowledge in the art and science of tree care through experience and by passing a comprehensive examination. As Master Gardeners we cannot recommend specific arborist individuals or companies but we can direct the public to two sites:
