GROWING COMMUNITIES

The UC Master Gardener Program teaches people how to grow food and garden sustainably to protect California's natural resources. By customizing local gardening outreach to account for unique local landscapes and the diversity of California's residents, we strive to meet the needs of all the communities we serve.

The UC Master Gardener Program:

- » hosts hands-on educational workshops teaching how to garden sustainably to protect California's natural resources
 - answers questions by email or phone about how to grow fruits, vegetables, and flowers, and manage pests in the garden
 - provides hands-on demonstrations at school, community, and demonstration gardens
- » teaches horticulture skills to youth and adults in detention centers, seniors in memory care facilities, and veterans at military-serving organizations

... and so much more!

When in-person events and classes could no longer take place, a movement grew to support our communities, answer questions, and extend information. Understanding the incredible benefits of gardening and connecting to nature to reduce stress and anxiety, UC Master Gardener volunteers answered a surge in demand for gardening content through email, phone calls, web content, videos, and Zoom. While programming quickly switched online to support "gardening in place," the program still found safe ways to support our







OUR COMMITMENT TO DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION

This past year, we laid a foundation for our statewide diversity, equity, and inclusion work by introducing educational resources, closely examining and improving current practices, and engaging in peer dialogue.

In 2020:

- » We introduced implicit bias resources and training statewide to all 6,000+ UC Master Gardener volunteers.
- » Our annual UC Master Gardener Program Coordinator meeting focused on inclusive volunteer selection and recruitment strategies.
- » We hosted a discussion for coordinators and volunteer leaders, Racial Equity in the Garden, which provided an overview of a new racial-equity resources webpage to guide training and understanding.

Looking ahead to diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts in the future. We've mapped out an active approach to raise the bar for diversity, equity, and inclusion in the UC Master Gardener Program by identifying barriers to engagement and addressing social justice shortfalls.

- » Learning and Development: We are committed to promoting and participating in lifelong learning opportunities for our UC Master Gardener community to improve our understanding of racial and social justice.
- » **Equity Assessment:** A preliminary equity assessment, focused on racial equity, will be completed by the UC Master Gardener Program's statewide office to evaluate our program's status and to identify next steps and future interventions.
- Inclusive Volunteer Selection: We will continue to expand our efforts to evaluate program resources through the filter of diversity, equity, and inclusion. The work started in 2020 to revamp our new volunteer application and volunteer position description. New templates will be released in 2021. We are striving to improve the accessibility of our digital education and training materials for people with disabilities.
- » National Network: To ensure that we learn about different approaches, successes, and missteps, we will continue to connect and collaborate not only within UC ANR but also with national Extension Master Gardener colleagues.
- Celebrating California Gardens: Collectively, with coordinators and volunteers, a blog series will be developed celebrating culturally important plants and foods, sometimes missing from UC Master Gardener curricula. For 2021, we look forward to celebrating Black History Month, Asian Pacific American Heritage Month, Hispanic Heritage Month, and American Indian Heritage Month.


FOOD GARDENING



In April of 2020, Jenny Martinez drove from store to store searching for toilet paper, pantry items, and fresh vegetables or fruits to fill her fridge. Working full-time and with two young children distancelearning at home, Jenny hadn't had time to make a trip to the grocery store before the aisles were left empty. "I remember walking into the grocery store and wondering, what is happening?" says Jenny. "I wasn't prepared for the feelings of panic that seeing empty shelves brought to me. I couldn't believe how bare the store looked. I drove across town, visiting store after store to find the items I needed."

It was the coronavirus pandemic that drove Jenny to start her own patio vegetable garden. "I had always thought about starting a garden but never had the time," Jenny says. "Between being home and wanting to make sure my family would have our small garden of fresh tomatoes, herbs, and strawberries, I felt like it was the perfect time to start one."

Just like Jenny's own personal story, history has shown us that many people turn to gardening in times of crisis. The past year has exposed our food supply's fragility during a crisis with empty



grocery store aisles, long lines at food pantries, and overwhelmed online retailers. According to Packaged Facts, 25% of consumers reported planting a food garden because of the pandemic.

Throughout all this, UC Master Gardener volunteers across California were thinking about ways to support their neighbors, friends, and community members looking to start a food garden for the first time or improve their gardening practices.

73% of respondents at UC Master Gardener Program events reported starting or improving gardening practices around growing edible plants.

To meet the growing demand of home food gardeners in **Los Angeles County,** UC Master Gardener volunteers developed a popular "Garden in Place" online workshop series. Weekly one-hour workshops focused on various gardening topics, emphasizing how to garden with items you already have. "Our "Garden-in-Place" workshops arose organically from friends worried about the COVID-19 emergency, worried about shortages, and stuck at home. "Gardening was both an activity that could be done with family and a way to have some agency in an ou of-control world and at least in part assure some foo variety in uncertain times," says UC Master Garden Roger Gray.

Los Angeles County also continued its "Grow LA Victory Garden" series, virtually offering gardening lessons that included food gardening best practices. One of the classes focused on how to plant the seed from your food pantry and how to read a seed pack "Grow LA Victory Garden classes filled up within a week! The demand for education around growing your food is very high in Los Angeles County," says program coordinator Valerie Borel. "We are excited to see so many people interested in growing their food. We have plans for an online LA Victory Garden series offered in Spanish in the spring of 2021."

Two hours north of Los Angeles, UC Master Gardener volunteers in **Santa Barbara County** partnered with a local community resilience nonprofit to develop a "Growing Community" workshop series. The series taught home gardeners

how to grow an abundance of fresh fruits and
vegetables to support the increased demand on local
food banks. UC Master Gardeners in Santa Barbara
also offer weekly one-hour online talks, with a
dedicated Q&A time to help new gardeners.
The UC Master Gardener program in San
Luis Obispo has been donating food from its
demonstration garden since 2016. UC Master
Gardener Program coordinator Maria Murrietta
reported seeing needs at her food bank triple in
March 2020, and that seed racks at two local San
Luis Obispo nurseries were nearly empty. "Food
insecurity is not a new topic, but is a new concern for
many people for the first time," explains Murrietta.
"In San Luis Obispo County, our community benefits
from the harvest at our demonstration garden and
gardening education that the volunteers provide. I
think COVID-19 has highlighted the importance of
what UC Master Gardeners can offer a community,
and it has reminded UC Master Gardener volunteers
of how important their work is. Their skills and
knowledge and their desire to contribute go beyond
helping other gardeners have a pretty landscape!"





COMMUNITY WELL-BEING

The popularity of gardening surged in the spring of 2020 when statewide stay-at-home orders were issued in California to help slow the spread of COVID-19. With more people social-distancing, working from home, and distancelearning, people sought activities they could do to beautify their space, stay active, and reduce stress or anxiety.

When "Kids' Day in the Garden," one of the largest events for the UC Master Gardener Program in Calaveras **County**, was canceled, UC Master Gardener volunteers knew that they still wanted to help children and parents in Gardener volunteers quickly changed the annual event theme to "Kids' Day in the Garden - at Home!" 150 takehome garden kits were assembled and distributed to all expressed gratitude for having the activity available to do at home at a time when most activities were canceled or postponed. Take-home garden kits were also distributed to 500 elementary students in El Dorado County as part of a partnership between the UC Master Gardener

According to a survey by Axiom Marketing, "people turned to gardening because it gave them something to do while their community grow an interest in gardening. UC Master isolated at home, it provided a source of exercise, and helped to cope with stress. But, overwhelmingly, most were gardening to add beauty in their lives." The pandemic has connected people to the many benefits of gardening and the families that registered for the event. Families and children important role and benefits of gardens and green spaces. The UC Master Gardener Program helped people embrace a connection to nature through whatever garden space they had available to them. "UC Master Gardeners has been a big part of my life during the pandemic," said a workshop participant in San Mateo County. Whether you have a Program, Cal Fresh Healthy Living UC, and the California backyard, patio, or single window box, UC Master Gardener Dairy Council. Seeds were distributed to students with volunteers encouraged gardeners to get outside and put information about how to successfully grow their own food their hands in the soil or tend to whatever they had at using limited supplies. their disposal.

69% of respondents reported spending more time gardening or outside as a result of attending a UC Master Gardener Program workshop or event.

The newest UC Master Gardener Program in California, Stanislaus County, is helping its community feel more connected to nature with the development of its new demonstration garden. UC Master Gardener Roxanne Campbell was passionate about having an educational garden space in her community after attending training in her neighboring county. "I was able to enjoy the demonstration garden the UC Master Gardeners of San Joaquin County had built. It inspired me so that I couldn't wait to get our garden up and running because I wanted to help create somewhere beautiful for our community to come learn from the UC Master Gardeners of Stanislaus County and hopefully be inspired to create beautiful gardens at home," says Roxanne.

"I see the Learning Landscape demonstration garden as a place where one day UC Master Gardener volunteers, community partners, friends, and neighbors can come together to learn from each other best practices for gardening," explains program coordinator Anne Schellman. "Gardens provide a place where people can experience nature, which has many health and well-being benefits. Our hope is that our new demonstration garden will provide that to people."

The UC Master Gardener Program of El Dorado County also provided learning opportunities alongside its community partner MORE, a nonprofit that provides services to adults with developmental disabilities and empowers individuals with disabilities to enhance their quality of life. Despite not being able to meet in person, UC Master Gardeners continued to engage MORE clients. A team of volunteers developed learning opportunities and videos to share about various gardening topics and projects like how to build a birdhouse and grow succulents.

"Our partnership with the UC Master Gardener Program has had a significant impact on our clients. It opened up a whole new hands-on experience, and our clients learned about where food comes from, how it grows, and the miracle of harvesting. UC Master Gardeners treated our clients with such respect that they felt part of the community. While in-person activities had to pause because of COVID-19, UC Master Gardeners actively supported MORE clients. We can't wait to return in-person to the garden!" says Susie Davies, Chief Executive Officer at MORE.


EXPANDING OUR REACH



"How do I grow seeds?" "What is this bug on my tomato?" "Should I add compost?" These are the types of questions that flooded into the UC Master Gardener Program. This past year, with COVID-19 stay-at-home orders and limited safe activities, the UC Master Gardener Program saw a rush of gardeners looking for help and advice on starting a garden. Calls and emails poured into UC Master Gardener Program hotlines, Facebook groups, and websites.

"We experienced an exciting increase in gardening activities and interest this year," says statewide program director Missy Gable. "People looking for information about how to become a UC Master Gardener volunteer increased by almost 50% on our online inquiry form."

The traditional method for extending educational workshops and events has been in-person, which was impossible because of COVID-19 restrictions. The program had to think about creative ways to help this new wave of gardeners.




Followers on the statewide UC Master Gardener Program Facebook page doubled in 2020, and subscribers on the statewide YouTube channel grew by 61%.

In Riverside County, a trio of UC Master Gardener volunteers who help coordinate youth and school gardens quickly shifted gears to continue supporting schools, with virtual gardening education. UC Master Gardener volunteers Chris Curtis, Kim Coons-Leonard, and Brad Hardison lead local youth and school garden projects in Riverside County. "UC Master Gardeners have had a robust program that supports youth and school gardens for a number of years, providing consulting and on-site education in the garden. For us, the pandemic changed the types of services we could deliver, but it also provided an opportunity to bring the science of gardening into a format that can be used online when we can't be in the gardens with students," stated Curtis.

Over the past year, UC Master Gardeners in UC Master Gardeners in Sacramento County saw Riverside County developed 20 digital educational the pandemic as an opportunity to work on new extension projects. A team of 55 UC Master Gardener gardening lessons and made them available at no cost to educators, parents, students, and the public. volunteers formed a video production group and UC Master Gardener volunteers are in the process collaborated on a series of 30 educational videos of developing a video series to add to their TK-12 for its new YouTube channel, focused on how to grade educational toolkit. Reaching more residents in the county with UC Master Gardener Program in Colusa County. "Our local newspaper hosts several podcasts, and they approached the UC Master Gardener Program and asked if we would be interested in starting one," explains program coordinator Gerry Hernandez. The podcast, titled "A Garden Runs Through It," broadcasts monthly, sharing sustainable gardening best practices and answering the community's most common gardening questions.

1st Place **Reminiscence Gardening**

San Diego County

The UC Master Gardener Program of San Diego was inspired by its growing understanding of the need for more everyday experiences that address the issues facing members of our community affected by dementia-related diseases. UC Master Gardener volunteers in San Diego County saw an opportunity

to collaborate with residential memory care communities and Alzheimer's San Diego (AlzSD) to provide sensory exploration and tabletop gardening activities for individuals living with dementia and their care partners, and founded the Reminiscence Gardening project.



UC Master Gardeners in San Diego County, alongside AlzSD, offered social activities for individuals with dementia and their caregivers. The Reminiscence Gardening project's goal for those individuals is to boost energy levels, build confidence, prolong maintenance of existing skills, and perpetuate a sense of purpose and joy through gardening. UC Master Gardener volunteers with the Reminiscence Gardening project are sharing their love of gardening and their advanced training from the UC Master Gardener program for the benefit of those in the community who need it most. 2nd Place **Gardening with Underserved Communities**

Contra Costa County

Gardens can bring people together regardless of their race, color, age, sex, disability, or religion. The UC Master Gardener Program of Contra Costa County wanted to meet people where they are in their communities across the county and ensure they had access to quality sustainable gardening information and resources from the University. Collaborating with Contra Costa Health Services, th County Department of Behavioral Health, Bi-Bett Corporation, Eden Housing, and the Contra Costa County Veterans Service Office, the UC Master Gardener Program of Contra Costa County created a series of gardening lessons for outreach at senior centers, residential treatment centers, and at the loca Veterans Services campus.



project's inception in 2018, and with the help of 50 UC Master Gardener volunteers, more than 1,000 individuals living with dementia and their family members, caregivers, and staff have been able to participate. Serving nine different residential care facilities across San Diego County, the Reminiscence Gardening project provides step-by-step instructions for gardening activities that can easily be replicated at home. UC Master Gardener volunteers in San Diego are making a meaningful difference in their community and the Reminiscence Gardening project is a wonderful way to express that.

3rd Place **Mornings at Martial Cottle** Park... Lessons in the garden for school children

Santa Clara County

Working together with community partners, the UC Master Gardeners of Santa Clara County created and taught a science- and nutrition-based curriculum for field trips at San Jose's Martial Cottel Park. Through dynamic, hands-on, outdoor lessons in a garden setting, second graders take part in a half day of healthy food and science learning. Local grants helped pay for the cost of transportation for Title 1 schools and schools in low-income neighborhoods.

Centuries-old oak trees, native plants, flowers, and raised garden beds serve as the backdrop for this extraordinary four-acre teaching and demonstration garden, managed by UC Master Gardener volunteers. Students, teachers and chaperones rotate through four learning stations around the garden every 25 minutes while being taught about a plant's lifecycle, insects, pests vs. beneficial insects, and nutrition through growing and eating healthy fruit and vegetables.

At the end of the day the students, teachers, and UC Master Gardener volunteers gather to gether to review what they have learned. Families are encouraged to return to the garden any time during the garden's normal open hours. "I have a special-needs brother and I think you all did a really good job. Don't change a thing!" said a teacher following a recent field trip. For some students, their visit to Martial Cottel Park is their first time in a garden or hearing about how plants and food grow. UC Master Gardener volunteers are thrilled to be able to introduce these students to the wonders of science and horticulture.

When asked for comments and suggestions for future trips, teachers said the following:



"Kids were very engaged and enjoyed themselves. This was exactly aligned with our current unit of study."
