While competing on the state level, I had a wonderful time meeting the other contestants, especially in the trash category. The outfits were amazing, an astronaut outfit made entirely of refrigerator bags, a young girl who was sponsored for her outfit by the feed company itself, and a high school student with an artistic dress with all sorts of materials incorporated. When I succeeded at State, I was invited to attend Western National Roundup in Colorado and would be further impressed by the works of wonder stitched by the incredible state winners.

After a quick two hour and fifteen minute trip, my surroundings had changed drastically. Gone was the sun just peeking through the clouded sky in a world where 60 degrees constituted a jacket; now, a light snow covered the ground and sidewalks were slick with ice. Contestants from all corners of America had come to the hotel to compete in contests ranging from Hippology to Consumer Decision Making. The evening of our arrival, a coach information meeting was held where we learned that the competition was graded in three categories: garment, interview, and modeling. The next day, contestants and coaches alike gathered to take (the above) pictures and listen to an overview of the day's events. We would interview at our assigned times and then return for the modeling segment. The contestants practiced modeling, then left as interviews began.

As shown in the photo, the outfits and seamstresses alike were outstanding. One girl had drawn, designed, and printed her own dinosaur fabric then crafted a romper. Another had crocheted her entire dress adding in beads to accentuate the Flapper style. The most impressive to me however, was the real life Belle who walked across the stage. All the outfits were exceptional and each girl had her own story, just like me, of trials and struggles that went along with their outfit. In the end, I won Reserve Champion in modeling, and 4th place overall for interviews.




County Presentation Day
