Monthly Meeting Brings Together Master Gardeners from All Over the State

With such different climates and growing seasons, what would UC Master Gardeners from Riverside and Tulare Counties have in common? A lot, it turns out.

Master Gardeners from all over the state have been gathering for meetings online at noon every second Wednesday of the month to discuss everything from how they put together school gardens to how they reach gardeners through social media. They've been meeting as part of the newly formed Southern California Master Gardeners Connect group.

UC Master Gardener, Melody Knox, represents the Riverside County Program at the meetings and says she is enjoying meeting new Master Gardeners and learning from them.

Knox said the group had its start in October 2023 during the State Master Gardener Conference at the Granlibakken Lodge in Lake Tahoe. A Master Gardener from the San Diego area began collecting people's contact information so they could stay in touch with each other, and the meetings grew out of that.

The meetings allow sharing of resources.

For example, when Riverside County Program Master Gardener, Rebecca Levers, did a presentation on firescaping, Master Gardeners from other counties were able to take that information and use it as a base for their own presentations.

"They didn't have to go through and rebuild everything, or do all this research, because she had everything pretty much there," Knox said.

Participants have come to the meetings from San Bernardino, Imperial, San Diego and Orange Counties and even as far away as Tulare County in central California.

Knox said another meeting benefit is the information Master Gardeners take away on climate or conditions in other counties – and that's knowledge they can pass on.

She noted that it's not uncommon for visitors from out of county to show up at the Ask a Master Gardener Information Tables. While normally it might be hard for a Riverside County

Master Gardener to give an out-of-county person advice, they might just know the answer from attending the Connect meetings, or they can refer the person to a specific Master Gardener from their same county.

Knox said the meetings aren't limited to longtime program participants with thousands of hours. Newer Master Gardeners can also attend the meetings.

The meetings are not the only source of crosscountry information sharing. Knox also recommends that Master Gardeners subscribe to some of the newsletters put out by the other county programs.

Knox said she's learned more about some of the other newsletters since joining the Connect group. She said they're not only a good resource for people to familiarize themselves with other counties, but also for them to learn something new that could benefit them in their own gardens.

Knox looks forward to continuing collaboration between the different county programs and looks forward to them finding new ways to assist each other. "We should have a better connection with one another since we're pretty much doing the same thing," she said.

The Children's Discovery Museum of the Desert Garden is alive and well. Located in Rancho Mirage, the six-and-a-half-acre site of the Museum was donated by The Honorable Walter Annenberg and the Annenberg Foundation with facilities built through the donation of public and private funds. Its proximity to Interstate 10 provides excellent access for the Valley's more than 70,000 schoolchildren.

The Riverside County Master Gardeners in the Desert welcome children and their parents to this garden created at the Museum with tours to share the five beds and all that grows within them.



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We have a pollinator bed, an herb bed, a vegetable bed with tomato, lettuce, and other veggies, a fruit bed with strawberries and a red seedless grape vine, and a bulb bed where we also plant our watermelon and pumpkin seeds. Thank you, Thurman Howard for donating cabbage seedlings for this bed. Some children planted Sunflower seeds, some watermelon seeds, and some pumpkin seeds.



To locals we give each child a tomato and/or a lavender seedling and a Sunflower seed to take home. Our out of state & Canadian visitors have to settle for a sunflower seed as they cannot take a plant on the airplane. But when they see the mammoth sunflower we grew from seed, they are happy!



Today we shared our Butterflies, which are ready to be released soon. AND the children loved handling the Ladybugs!



Cumin, Camels and Caravans: A Spice Odyssey by Gary Paul Nabhan Contributed by Ken Niemeyer, UC Master Gardener



The Master Gardener desert book club (Book Thyme) has read several of Gary Paul Nabhan books which focus on the Sonoran and Mojave Deserts. However, this book takes the reader on a vivid and far-ranging journey across time and space in the fascinating look at the relationship between the spice trade and culinary imperialism.

Drawing on his own family's history as spice traders, as well as travel narratives, historical accounts and his expertise as an ethnobotanist, Nabhan describes the critical roles Semitic peoples and desert floras had in setting the stage for globalized spice trade.

Traveling along the four prominent trade routes - the Silk Road, the Frankincense Trail, the Spice Route, and the Camino Real (for chiles and chocolate) - Nabhan follows the caravans of itinerant spice merchants. The author travels from frankincense gathering grounds and ancient harbors of the Arabian Peninsula to the port of Zayton on the China Sea to the desert of Santa Fe in Southwest United States. His stories, recipes, and linguistic analysis of cultural diffusion routes reveal the extent to which aromatics such as cumin, cinnamon, saffron, and peppers became adopted worldwide as signature ingredients of diverse cuisines.

This history of exploration and circumnavigation of the Northern and Southern Hemispheres prior to Columbus is mind expanding and a read very worthwhile.

Desert Compost Update Contributed by Dan Garrow, UC Master Gardener

Desert area UC Master Gardeners of Riverside County support the "Milk & Honey" Compost/Garden project originally started by Desert Compost in 2023.

This project resides on the grounds of the United Methodist Church of Palm Springs (UMCPS) in a formerly unused outdoor space. The UMCPS has a weekly food ministry that serves over 600 meals per week. Post-meal food scraps from that ministry are saved to then be composted by the Milk & Honey team. Those scraps provide the bulk of the material that is composted weekly.

Local businesses such as a juice shop and coffee shop plus area residents also provide compostable food scraps. An average of 700 pounds of food waste that would otherwise end up in a landfill is composted weekly by the Milk & Honey team.

Master Gardeners support the project on Wednesday mornings (bright and early!) completing the necessary tasks for a great compost product. They first record the weight of food scraps and build new compost piles from those fresh scraps using a 'brown' to 'green' formula. They record the internal temperature of existing compost piles. Then turn over and move those existing compost piles. Finally, five to six months later they sift the finished product of mature piles into buckets for free distribution to anyone in the community.


